MASTER AGREEMENT MODIFIED; NOTE HIRING CLAUSE CHANGES

In order to comply with the recent ruling of the National Labor Relations Board (in connection IMPORTANT . . . KEEP ACCURATE RECORDS with what is commonly referred to as the "Mountain Pacific Case and the Brown Olds Case") whereby the board has ruled that unions must operate on a non-discriminatory basis, it was necessary for us to modify our collective bargaining agreement to conform.

The master agreement with the Northern and Central Chapters of the Associated General Contractors of America, Inc., has been modified and changed as of October 22, 1958.

Following is the complete text of the modifications in the

The parties agree that the Master Agreement dated May 20, 1957 etween Northern California and Central California Chapters, The Associated General Contractors of America, Inc., and Operating Engineers Local Union No. 3 of the International Union of Operating Engineers shall be modified and changed as follows:

1. Section No. 3 of said Master Agreement shall be modified and changed to read as follows:

Section No. 3. HIRING

(a) General

(1) When an Individual Employer performs any work covered by this agreement including the operation of equipment used in the performance of such work covered by this agreement he shall hire Employes and applicants for employment to perform such work cluding the operation of such quipment in accordance with the provisions of this agreement.

(2) When an Individual Employer performs any work covered by this agreement in the Individual Employer's maintenance and repair. shop or shops or does field repairs equipment maintenance covby this agreement he shall aire Employes and applicants for employment to perform such work in accordance with the provisions of this agreement provided however that if the Individual Employer is covered by a bona fide existing written agreement with any other local union covering shop vork this sub-section shall have no application to such work.

(3) In the ement there should be jurisdictional dispute with respect to any work covered by this agreement or the operation of any equipment used to perform work covered by this agreement the dispute shall be subject to and resolved in accordance with the pro-edures set out in Section No. 18, Jurisdictional Disputes, of this

agreement.

(b) Preferred Employes

(1) For the purpose of this Sec-on No. 3 only, the Employes shall be classified as follows:

Class A-Persons who have been aployed or available for employent in Northern California, which 's herein defined as that portion of Sherein defined as that portion of California above the Northerly boundary of Kern County, the Northerly boundary of San Luis Obispo County and the Westerly boundaries of Inyo and Mono Counties, or Northern Nevada, Counties, or Northern Nevada, which is herein defined as that porion of Nevada above the Northerly boundaries of Esmeralda, Nye and Lincoln Counties, for a period of two (2) years, next preceding their registering to be dispatched, in any one or more classifications set out in Section No. 12 of this agreement on the type or kind of raft work covered by this agree-

Class B-Persons who have been employed or available for employ-ment in Northern California or Northern Nevada for a period less than two (2) years, next preceding their registering to be dispatched, in any one or more classifications et out in Section No. 12 of this agreement on the type or kind of craft work covered by this agree-

(2) A Class A Employe who is not employed or available for employment in Northern California or Northern Nevada in any one or more of the classifications set out n Section No. 12 hereof on the

Employe hereunder, provided, however, that the period of two (2) years will be extended for any period of incapacity or military service or for any period during which he is transferred by an Individual Employer to a job or project outside Northern California or Northern Nevada and is there employed by such Individual Employer or by a joint venture with which said Individual Employer is associated on the type or kind of craft work covered by this agreement. Any person who has lost his preference as a Class A Employe under the provisions of the immediately preceding sentence and who desires to return to employment or availability for employment under this agreement shall do so as a Class B Em-

(3) A Class B Employee who is not employed or available for employment in Northern California or Nothern Nevada in any one or more of the classifications set out in Section No. 12 hereof on the type or kind of craft work covered by this agreement for a period of one (1) year shall thereupon lose his preference as a Class B Employe hereunder, provided, however, that the period of one (1) year will be extended for any period of incapacity or military service or for any period during which he is transferred by an Individual Employer to a job or project outside Northern California or Northern Nevada and is there employed by such Individual Employer or by a joint venture with which said Individual Employer is associated on the type or kind of craft work covered by this agreement. (4) The Apprentices' preference is limited to Apprentices and the Operating Engineers' preference to Operating Engineers, provided that an Apprentice with a preference shall, upon becoming an Operating Engineer, carry his preference with him. For the purposes of this Section No. 3 only the term "Apprentice" shall include the following classifications: Fireman, oiler, signalman, switchman, brakeman, deckhand, tar pot fireman, heavy duty repairman helper, partsman (heavy duty repair parts room), head chainman, rear chainman, rodman, fireman hot plant, mixer box operator (concrete plant), tar pot fireman (power agitated), spreader boxman (with screeds), boxman (asphalt plant), box op-erator, screedman. For the purposes of this Section No. 3 only the term "Operating Engineer" shall include all other classifications

(5) All Union officers and employes of the Union who are members of the Union and all Employes heretofore or hereafter advanced by their Indavidual Employer to a type or kind of craft work covered supervisory position, shall upon reby this agreement for any consecuturning to the employment of an tive period of two (2) years shall Individual Employer as an Employe lose his preference as a Class Aunder this agreement do so with

the same preference as if they had continually worked as Employes for Individual Employers.

(c) Hiring Procedures

(1) The Individual Employer shall secure all Employes and applicants for employment required by Section No. 3(a) of this agreement to be employed for the performance of work covered by this agreement including the operation of equipment used in the perfor-mance of such work through the Employment Offices of the Union subject to the limitations and exclusions in Sections Nos. 1(a)(4), 12 and 13 of this agreement and such Employment Offices shall dispatch in accordance with the classifications in Section No. 12 of the agreement subject to the limitations and exclusions in Sections Nos. 1(a)(4), 12 and 13 of this

agreement. (2) Satisfactory and competent men will be furnished in accordance with the provisions of this agreement within forty-eight (48) hours of the time they are requested if they are available and in the event they cannot be or are not furnished within such period, the Individual Employer may em-ploy any person but shall arrange for a dispatch to be obtained for him from an Employment Office of the Union within twenty-four (24) hours of the commencement of such employment and such dispatch shall upon request be issued to the Employe.

(3) In dispatching each Employment Office shall first dispatch by classification Class A Employes who may be unemployed and registered for work in the office dispatching and thereafter by classi-fication Class B Employes who may be unemployed and registered for work in the office dispatching and thereafter by classification applicants who have registered for employment in the office dispatching under Sub-Section (5) hereof. Provided, however, that in dispatching such applicants those with the most experience in the trade shall be dispatched first and those with the least experience in the trade last.

It is vitally important that you be able to show conclusive proof of the number of hours worked on each job and the name of the employer responsible for the payroll whenever a welfare claim is contested and when annual pension credits are determined. The best proofs in this regard are, of course, your payroll stubs. You are again reminded to keep these valuable records.

The duration of the validity of the registration of Employes and the applications of applicants may be fixed for each Employment Office from time to time by agreement between the Collective Bargaining Representative of the Employer and the Union and notice thereof shall be posted as hereinafter provided.



(d) Non-discriminatory operation and appears procedure. (1) The Union will conduct such

registration facilities and operate such Employment Offices without discrimination either in favor of or against Employes or applicants for employment or any of them by reason of membership or non-membership in any union, or by reason of acting on behalf of or in opposition to any union, except to the extent that membership in the Union shall be a condition of employment as provided in Section No. 3A(a) of this agreement. The Union recog-nizes its obligations and therefore assumes full responsibility to each Employe or applicant for employment for any loss or damage resulting from any such discrimina-tion or other violation of law by the Union. The provisions of this Section shall govern over any conflicting provision or requirement of the constitution of the Interna-tional Union of Operating Engi-neers or of the constitution, bylaws, working rules or other rules of the Union, and selection of Employes and applicants for employ-ment for dispatch to jobs shall be on a non-discriminatory basis and shall not be based on, or in any way affected by, union membership, by-laws, rules, regulations, constitutional provisions, or any other aspect or obligation of union membership, policies, or require-ments. The Individual Employer shall not discriminate either in fa-vor of or against Employes or ap-plicants for employment or any of them by reason of membership or non-membership in any union, or by reason of acting on behalf of or in opposition to any union, except to the extent that membership in the Union shall be a condition of employment as provided in Section No. 3A(a) of this agreement. (2) Any Employe or applicant

for employment aggrieved by the operation of such registration facalities or Employment Offices as applied to him shall have the right to submit his grievance to the Board of Adjustment created by Section No. 21 of this agreement, provided that such submission is made in writing within ten (10) days after the occurrence of the (Continued on Page 3)

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Here Are Modifications in the Master Agreement

(Continued from Page 1) grievance. The Board shall have full power to adjust the grievance and its decision thereon shall be final and binding upon the Em-ploye or applicant for employment and upon all other parties hereto. (e) Regulations governing Employment Offices.

Each Employment Office shall maintain the following lists on which persons not currently employed in the highway, general building and heavy construction industry may register for employ-ment at any time during which the Employment Office is open:

(A) List A for Employes, i.e., Operating Engineers who have been employed or available for employment in Northern California which is herein defined as that portion of California above the Northerly boundary of Kern County, the Northerly Boundary of San Luis Obispo County and the Westerly boundaries of Inyo and Mono Counties, or Northern Nevada, which is herein defined as that portion of Nevada above the Northerly boundaries of Esmeralda, Nye and Lincoln Counties, for a period of two (2) years next preceding their registering to be dispatched, in any one or more classifications set out in Section No. 12 of this Master Agreement on the type or kind of craft work covered by this Master Agreement.

(B) List B for Employes, i. e., Operating Engineers who have been employed or available for employment in Northern California Northern Nevada for a period of less than two (2) years next preceding their registering to be dispatched, in any one or more classification set out in Section No. 12 of this Master Agreement on the type or kind of craft work covered by this Master Agreement.

(C) List C for applicants for employment, persons who do not meet the tests set out in (A) or (B) above.

(D) Separate lists shall be kept for Apprentices on the same basis as for Operating Engineers. (E) No Employe or applicant

may register for employment as an Operating Engineer and an Apprentice at the same time.

(F) Any person who while registered for employment in an Employment Office accepts employment in the highway, general building and heavy construction industry other than under this agree-ment shall notify the Employment Office of the Union in San Francisco in writing within forty-eight (48) hours after such acceptance to strike his name from the list or lists on which he is registered.

(2) Employes registering shall set forth their name, address and/ or telephone number and classification or classifications of work sought and which they are qualified to perform and may change such classification or classifications at any time before being dis-Applicants registering patched. shall set forth their name, address and/or telephone number and classification or classifications of work sought and their experience theriein and may change such classification or classifications at any time before being dispatched.

as provided in Section No. 3A (a) of this Master Agreement.

(13) Upon being dispatched, the Employe or applicant shall proceed to the job at once. When call is made to an Employment Office for men to report to work on the day of request a reasonable time shall be allowed for men traveling from the Employment Office to job site as agreed by the Employment Office. An Employe or applicant who fails to report for work when dispatched on the shift to which dispatched or within the time agreed to if dispatched to work on the day of request without good cause therefor shall not be eligible for dispatch for seven (7) days thereafter. When an Employe or applicant is requested by Individual Employer to be dispatched on the day of the request, and the Employe or applicant does report for work that same day, he shall be paid for his full shift if he reports during the first half of the shift and works the balance of the shift or for the half shift if he reports during the second half of the shift and works the balance of the shift.

(14) Any Employe or applicant or employment aggrieved by the operation of the registration facilities or Employment Office of the Union or these Regulations as applied to him has the right to submit his grievance to the Board of Adjustment created by Section No. 21 of this Master Agreement, provided that such submission is madein writing within ten (10) days after the occurrence of the grievance. The Board shall have full power to adjust the grievance and its decision thereon shall be final and binding upon the Employe or applicant for employment and upon all other parties hereto.

Forms for the submission of such grievance shall be available at all times in each Employment Office. (15) These Regulations, including the special provisions govern-

 A dispute complaint or grievance concerning compliance with the provisions of Section No. 3, except under Sections Nos. 3(a) (3) or 3(d) (2); provided however that

(i) Disputes, complaints or grievances concerning the application of the provisions of Section No. 3 shall be arbitrable under Section No. 3(d)

(ii) Disputes, complaints or gievances concerning the interpretation of the provisions of Section No. 3 shall be arbitrable under this Section No. 21. In such an arbitration initiated by the Employer or any Individual Employer, the assumption of responsibility set out in Section No. 3(d) (1) shall be inoperative as to past periods terms.

to the extent that the interpretation established by the arbitration is in conflict with the interpretation contended for by the Union.

A dispute, complaint or grievance arising under and cov-ered by the provisions of the Jurisdictional Disputes Clause, Section No. 18.

Disputes arising out of a violation of the Health and Welfare Clause, Section No. 15 hereof, and the Pension Clause Section No. 16 hereof, are exempted from the provisions of this Section to the extent provided in Section No. 17 and the applicable Trust Agreements.

(4) Disputes arising as a result of the failure of the parties to agree in the negotiation provided for under Section No. 19.

All other disputes, complaints and grievances are the subject of arbitration as follows:

A Board of Adjustment is hereby created for the settlement of disputes. It shall be composed of a panel selected by the Union and a panel selected by the Collective Bargaining Representative of Employer. Said Board shall organize within five (5) days of the signing of this agreement, and shall elect Chairman and Secretary and shall adopt rules of procedure which shall bind the contracting parties. Within twenty-four (24) hours of the time any dispute is referred to it by either party, two representatives from the Union panel and two representatives from the Collective Bargaining Representative of Employer panel shall meet as a Board, with a Chairman and Secretary to consider such dispute. Said Board shall have the power to adjust any differences that may arise regarding the meaning or enforcement of this contract. If the Board within twenty-four (24) hours after such meeting cannot agree on any mat-ter referred to it, the members thereof within three (3) days shall choose a fifth member, who shall have no business or financial connection with either party. The decision of said Board shall be determined by a majority of its mem-bers and shall be rendered within ten (10) days after such submission. Said dec.sion shall be within the scope and terms of this agreement and shall be final and binding on all parties hereto. Pending such decision, work shall be contonued in accordance with the provisions of this contract. The expense of employing said fifth person shall be borne equally by both parties. No proceedings hereunder based on any dispute, complaint or grievance herein provided for shall be recognized unless called to the attention of the Collective Bargaining Representative of Employer and the Union within fifteen (15) days after the alleged violation was committed. No Employe shall be required to exhaust the remedies provided in this Section No. 21 as a condition precedent to the commencement by him of a civil action for wages.

(b) In the event there is a dispute, complaint or grievance be-tween the Union and any Individual Employer concerning compli-ance with the provisions of Section No. 3, except under Sections No. 3(a) (3) or 3(d) (2), the Union is hereby specifically authorized to withdraw any or all of the Employes of such Individual Employer subject to this agreement from work covered by this agreement for such Individual Employer and such withdrawal shall not, so long as such dispute shall continue, be a violation of this agreement or any clause, sentence, paragraph or sec-tion of this agreement.

Any Employes so withdrawn or refusing to perform any work as herein provided shall not lose their status as Employes but no such Employe shall be entitled to claim or receive any wages or other compensation for any period during which he has been so withdrawn or refused to perform any

SQUAW VALLEY S7 MIL OLYMPICS PROGRAM

The beautiful Squaw Valley has been encroached upon as the site of the 1960 Olympic Winter Games and has been transformed into a beehive of activity in preparation for the international event.

When completed, there will be facilities carefully designed by meter practice jump. the architects and engineers to fit into the natural surroundings that will create one of the most attractive and finest winter sports areas in the world.

For the first time in the history of the Olympic Winter Games, all events will be held at one site, and the Olympic Vil lage will house all athletes and team officials. All events except the longer cross country tests will be within five minutes walk of the Village.

The games will be held Feb. ruary 18-28, 1960, but contestants will arrive about two months earlier for practice.

The Olympic complex of buildings will be in harmony with its mountain setting in the high Sierras only seven miles from the northern end of Lake Tahoe.

Whiskeytown Project to break in 1959. Whiskeytown Dam will be constructed on Clear Creek approximately 21/2 miles southeast of the village of Whiskeytown. The dam will re-regulate flows discharged from the Clear Creek Powerplant and the runoff from the Clear Creek drainage area. In addition it would 1959. serve as a diversion point for water to serve agricultural lands south of them. The reservoir will be 26 miles of shoreline.

The Whiskeytown Dam will be earth and rock fill. Height above streambed will be 278 feet, crest elevation 1,228 feet, crest length 2,150 feet, volume of embankment 4,143,000 cubic feet. Gross storage capacity 250,000 acre-feet, active storage capacity 217,000 acre-feet, inactive storage capacity 33,000 acre-feet, maximum water surface elevation 1,220.5 feet, normal water surface elevation 1,210 feet, area at gross storage capacity 3,250 acres.

Intake structure will be located in Whiskeytown Reservoir on Clear Creek, a tributary of the Sacramento River, Shasta other 7 miles of super hiway. County. Tunnel will be constructed about three miles easterly to the Spring Creek Powerplant and will connect with a 700-foot trailrace tunnel leading into Keswick Reservoir. 

> 9. Keep track of your safety record and keep everyone posted as to progress. A graph or chart, indicating gains and losses, is good for this purpose.

> 10. Encourage safety suggestions from all workers and, if the suggestion cannot be followed promptly, explain why to the worker.

> 11. Consider the advisability of giving each worker a copy of certain important safety rules that he is expected to follow.

12. Arrange for frequent and regular field safety inspections. In closing, I hope you all have a happy and safe Thanks-8. Consider the advisability of giving.

Nov. 4 Upset, a Strong Vote of Confidence For Labor in Cal., U.S.

A tide of anti-unionism, carefully built up by a year of Mc-Clellan Committee hearings in Washington and adopted as their top slogan by many candidates, was blocked by the voting public on Nov. 4, and the American labor movement was thereby given a historic vote of confidence and assurance.

California was a major battleground. Here, the union-busting right-to-work law was pressed by Senator Wm. Knowland, seeking the governorship. Both the law and Knowland were very soundly defeated. Knowland's public career was ruined by this illchosen issue.

In five out of six states where the "work laws" were proposed, they were defeated, and the tide was definitely turned against them. At present 19 states have them, and in 19 others they have been defeated or repealed.

The voters turned against the GOP and Ike clear across the nation, resulting in a Democratic Democratic governor (Pat Brown) and legislature for the first time in several decades. The sweep sent in the popular Brown in California and labor's endorsement, Clair Engle, as U.S. Senator.

In Nevada, the sweep knocked publicans. off Senator Malone and elected Democrat Howard Cannon. In strong-GOP Utah, it unseated and 20 non-endorsed defeated. Senator Arthur Watkins and put Before the election it was 43 Rein Democrat Frank Moss as U.S. publicans to 37 Democrats. Now Senator. The story was repeated it is reversed and final count in state after state across the nation. Candidates pushing "right to work" laws were beaten time after time.

Members of the Operating Engineers joined with those in other unions to help get out the biggest labor vote in years and in state elections thus far. thus help bring about the triumph of Nov. 4.

The big California upset gave us the second Democratic Gover-

nor in this century, popular Pat Brown. Only Republican possi. bly winning in the six major state offices was Secty, of State Frank Jordan. Demo winners included Lt. Gov. Glenn Anderson, Controller Alan Cranston, Treasurer Bert Betts and Atty. Gen. Stanley Mosk.

Four new Democratic congressmen, labor-backed, were elected, Clem Miller in the north-coast 1st district; Bizz Johnson in the north and mountain 2nd district; Jeff Cohelan in the Eastbay 7th district, an Geo. Kasem in the L.A. 25th district. This reversed the state's Congress delegation to a new 16 Congress and, in California, a Democrats and 14 GOP, having been 13 to 17 before.

Of the state propositions, the all-important No. 18 (right to work) was turned down by nearly a million votes, one of the worst beatings it has been given

No. 16, religious school tax, opposed by labor, was beaten. No. 17, revising the state sales and income taxes, pushed by labor as a counter-measure to use up the campaign money of No. 18 backers, was defeated. Labor did not campaign strongly for it, since it was largely a strategy proposition.

The first four propositions, backed by labor and dealing with school, construction, and harbor bonds, were approved by the voters.


