This is the only official Local 3 group on Facebook, and provides you with everything from meeting information, videos, Labor news and more, right in your Facebook feed. I encourage all of you to share the pro-union information you see on this online bulletin board to your own social media accounts. Doing so can help others, whether they are Local 3 members or not, understand the value and importance of our union.

Besides finding different ways of communicating with you, we have come up with another way to make your life easier. I am pleased to announce that members may now pay their dues online through the Local 3 website. Visit www.oe3.org and click on the top tab that reads "Pay Member Dues." You will then be directed to a secure, members-only login screen. Once you are registered on the site, you will be able to pay dues directly from your computer, phone or tablet. You will also have access to your membership information, including your dues payment history, status and member card. We hope to add this feature into the Local 3 Mobile App sometime in the near future, as well. Between traveling, COVID safety and our busy lives, paying your dues should be easy. We have heard the



membership's interest in having an online option, so we did what needed to be done to make this possible for you. Remember, we hear you. We are here for you. We work for you.

Your staff has been incredibly busy lately working for you! We have a huge organizing campaign going on right now with our Public Employee Department, which has the possibility of bringing in 250 new members from the Alameda County health care systems. Stay tuned for details of that campaign. We are continuing to educate Nevada Gold Mines (NGM), and our members, about what union representation means. If you work at the mines in Elko and are interested in becoming a job steward, please contact the Elko Hall at (775) 753-8761.

In Woodland, Calif., Waste Management tried to strip the company's employees of Local 3 representation. In response, we launched a multi-media campaign to inform these workers and local residents about the negative impact this effort would have on their community. We wanted the public to understand, these are not nameless workers, they are their neighbors and friends, and in some cases, they are their family members. They are all essential workers. They are also the kind of well-paid, professional workforce that serves as the backbone for any community and its local economy. I am happy to report that the membership overwhelmingly voted to keep their Local 3 representation and to keep their Union Strong!

While we've been busy representing you ... you've been busy, WORKING. Hours are good across our jurisdiction, despite COVID, and I discuss how well this is translating into our Health and Welfare and Pension Funds in my Semi-Annual Report on our YouTube channel. Throughout Northern California, our members are helping communities recover from last year's devastating wild fires (see this month's cover story). In Nevada, they're performing bridge demolition work (Nevada's Spaghetti Bowl Express). In the San Francisco Bay Area, they're upgrading wastewater treatment plants, creating housing facilities for the homeless and demoing old sections of the Stanford University campus. In Sacramento, they're updating the International Airport. And there's more work ahead! If congress passes the badly-needed, multi-trillion-dollar infrastructure package, known as the Build Back Better (BBB) plan, we'll be in good shape for many years to come. That's because important, long-term projects will be funded, allowing our members to continue doing what they do best: Building and improving our communities. In short, our members are doing a little bit of everything right now, and they're doing a lot of it.

Smart move to build smart city with union labor

In April, the Building and Construction Trades Council of Northern Nevada signed a Cooperative Development and Labor Agreement to build a proposed "smart city" for Blockchains, Inc. in Storey County, Nevada. The proposed smart city, known as Painted Rock Smart City and Innovation Park, has the potential to be the largest construction project in the state's history, exceeding the famous New Deal era projects that put Nevada on the map for construction workers seeking a great place to raise their families nearly 100 years ago.

employ over 124,000 people and create over \$7 billion in wages and salaries paid out to the region's workers.) For businesses and investors, it guarantees that all work will be performed by highlyskilled union workers who can meet the proposed community's high standards for clean energy, green construction and smart water use. For the State of Nevada, the agreement helps ensure that the total economic impact of the development, which studies have found to be around \$16 billion, remains in Nevada and benefits tax-paying Nevada residents and businesses. It will also help create

This historic agreement covers a whole new city and ensures that any and all development is done using local union labor, which is beneficial to Operating Engineers and other working people in the region, as well as local businesses, investors and the State of Nevada. For working people, the agreement ensures that this massive new project creates safe, good-paying, local jobs with collective bargaining rights and union representation. (Economic impact studies have concluded that the project would

another anchor for the state's economy, preventing the kind of economic pains that the state often experiences when other key industries, like tourism, take a hit.

The entire idea behind this project is to make Northern Nevada an internationally recognized hub for innovation, emerging technology and the businesses that use them. I look forward to seeing our members building Nevada's future and financially benefitting in the process.

The Hits Keep Coming

Infrastructure is key to America's success in the world economy and our ability to bring the middle class back to where it once was, but it has been years since any significant infrastructure investment has come out of Washington D. C. In 2017, Operating Engineers were excited about talk of a \$1 trillion infrastructure bill that would have meant thousands of jobs for Local 3 members and other Operating Engineers across the country. Unfortunately, that bill never materialized. Skip forward to 2021, and now there's talk of

a \$2 trillion plan! It's been called many things, the Infrastructure Plan, the American Jobs Plan or my personal favorite, the Build Back Better (BBB) Plan. Call it what you want, but if passed, this plan will be the biggest and best infrastructure investment ever to come out of our nation's capital.

The BBB Plan is great for Local 3 members because it seeks to fund the work our members would perform modernizing 20,000 miles of highways and roads, over 10,000 bridges, marine terminals,

> airports and rail systems, including the High Speed Rail (HSR) project in California, which is currently employing over 300 Local 3 members. The BBB Plan would also put our members to work on the nation's drinking water delivery system, high-speed broadband infrastructure and green energy projects, like the development of wind farms and solar fields, which are already putting many of our members to work while addressing concerns about the environment. In short, the BBB Plan would be a total win/win for our country, and especially for our members.

> Packaged with all of this is the Buy American Act and the Protecting the Right to Organize (PRO) Act. (See my article in the April Engineers News for more on the PRO Act.) The Buy American Act incentivizes employers to keep jobs in America and penalizes those who don't. Finally, as part of the promise to rebuild America's middle class, the BBB Plan includes prevailing wage protections and relies on union input and participation. With this funding and all of the other projects we have been able to secure through our political efforts in our fourstate jurisdiction, we can expect plenty of work for decades to come.

> As of this writing, the BBB Plan is still being negotiated and has not yet been signed into law. Hopefully, this historic legislation will be enacted and our entire country, and especially the members of this great Local, will prosper.

Stewards participate in virtual Stewards' Training

As we acknowledge the one-year anniversary of COVID "shelter in-place" orders, the Public Employee Division of Operating Engineers' Local 3 held a virtual training for 30 public-sector members in partnership with the Building and Construction Trades Council of Alameda County (BCTCAC). Both groups jointly represent workers from public agencies throughout Northern California. Members in attendance included those from Alameda County Public Works and General Services Agency, the cities of of Santa Rosa and San Pablo, kitchen staff from Marysville and more. Their stories were as diverse as their job classifications; however, they all came ready to build their union at their shop floors, school cafeterias, public transit lines, garages, yards and offices.

These stewards spent their Saturday learning from OE3 and BCTCAC staff about the union structure and basic role of a steward, COVID laws and updates, politics, communicating with members and effective skills for stewards, which include investigating grievances, preparing for contract negotiations, membership engagement during COVID and utilization of social media. They saw the "real life" utilization of supporting their union rep by gathering information (who, what, where, when and why) during a grievance investigation.

The virtual training allowed these members to build on their tool chest of skills. Members shared their stories, which created a sense of sense of community within their groups. They also learned how to better connect with non-members and bring them into the union through membership engagement, even during times of social distancing.

One key component of engagement involves political activism. Stewards shared personal experiences on how they helped build political power and how that influenced outcomes at the bargaining table. OE3's Political Director Chris Snyder gave the stewards a tutorial on OE3's approach to politics and how they can be engaged with the union's political program. Then, attendees were treated to a very special surprise, as California State Attorney General Rob Bonta, who is also a proud union member, addressed the group, praising their hard work in the public and private sectors. He pledged

> to work with OE3 and BCTCAC on supporting a pro-working-families' agenda at the State Assembly.

Risky Business

In El Dorado County, the Public Safety Dispatchers (PSDs) work 24 hours a day, seven days a week. PSDs are also known as 911 dispatchers, and they are the first line of defense, when someone calls 911 with an emergency. Recently, the El Dorado County Board of Supervisors had a serious decision to make regarding the PSDs, and they chose poorly.

The PSD Department in El Dorado County is seriously shortstaffed and has been for several years. The department is also struggling with keeping current staff and recruitment, because wages and benefits for these essential workers are lower than surrounding agencies. County officials, including those on the Board of Supervisors, the Sheriff's Department and Human Resources are all very aware of this.

That's why the Sheriff's Department and Human Resources asked the Board of Supervisors to increase the wages for PSDs before the expiration of the current Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) contract, because of the severity of the issue. Unfortunately, the Board of Supervisors decided not to fix the problem. Instead, they used the excuse that negotiations were coming up in six months, and things can be resolved then. They must have conveniently forgotten that during the last round of negotiations for this bargaining unit, the process went well over a year past the expiration of the MOU contract!

Besides failure to remember this, the Board has failed to recognize that a short-staffed PSD Department places the public safety at great risk. The current staff has to cover the shifts needed for 24hour coverage, meaning they work multiple overtime shifts in a week. (Each shift is 12 hours long.) Employees are fatigued, and it's affecting their health and well-being. The short staffing also means the PSD may miss radio traffic with the Sheriff's Deputies or risk putting them on hold due to being on the phones with the public. If they put the public on hold, other problems arise during emergency situations. The workload and area for the PSDs in El Dorado County is significantly greater than those agencies that past and current employees are seeking employment with. It's just a matter of time before something very bad will happen either to the public, deputies or PSD employees.

The Board of Supervisors has the ability to fix this problem, but they choose not to at the moment. Be prepared for our response, if these next negotiations go on longer than intended.

Specialized crew gets specialized training on homelessness cleanup

I represent three units at the City of Santa Rosa, and one of those units includes members whose tasks include cleaning up the garbage created by homeless encampments. As the homeless crisis has worsened throughout California, and more specifically, in the City of Santa Rosa, homeless cleanup seems to be the No. 1 priority of these workers, even though they have other tasks. Because one of the City Council's main priorities is maintaining a clean and beautiful city, Local 3 has been working with the City to find possible solutions to the increase in homeless encampment cleanups, since the issue has added much more work on top of this

Public Works crew that is already spread thin.

In talking with stewards William Fetrow, Scott Enbysk and soon-to-be Steward Brandon Keck, I learned that, according to numbers they tracked, in 2018, approximately 84 yards of garbage was removed from homeless encampments, and in 2019, that number skyrocketed to approximately 405 yards. Last year, that number jumped to more than 900 yards of garbage. After we all met, we requested a meeting with those

in management who had the authority to not only listen to our concerns, but do something about them. This meeting was timely and productive, because the issue of homeless cleanup was being presented to the City Council at its next meeting. Management listened to us and included our thoughts and ideas in their presentation to the City Council.

This collaborative approach proved successful because our stewards were sensitive to the fact that their duties were about so much more than cleaning up garbage. They took into consideration the human aspect of moving people's belongings, while stressing the need to keep the city clean. They understood the importance of having the same crew of people perform this work, so that consistent relationships and trust can be built between the encampment inhabitants and the crews cleaning up the area. This idea of

> consistency led to the creation of a specific crew of workers tasked with not only the cleanup of encampments, but the ongoing maintenance of keeping the city clean and free of garbage and debris. As discussed between Local 3 and the stewards, this specific cleanup crew must receive specialized training on the social aspect of homelessness, how to help alleviate emergency situations that may arise out of the process of cleaning up encampments, how to safely interact with those at these encampments and how to

properly handle and dispose of any hazardous waste that may be present.

Hats off to our City of Santa Rosa stewards for finding a way to bring a positive outcome to a major issue affecting the City.

Medicare Reminder

We get many, many inquiries about Medicare as Local 3 members reach age 65. Remember to always check with your local Social Security Office before finalizing anything, as they are the experts and provide the final word. Below are a few more tips to consider, but first and foremost, beware of scams. Anyone asking for your personal information should be a red flag to you. Do not give this information out!

- » The Local 3 Retiree Medical plan REQUIRES Medicare enrollment at age 65. It is MANDATORY.
- » If you are still on the Active Medical Plan, you do not need to enroll at age 65 as long as you are working and have active coverage.
- » At age 65, your medical premium will drop from \$500 monthly for yourself and spouse to \$250 monthly. (The member reaching age 65 will trigger this, not the spouse.)
- » Be sure to mail the Trust Funds Office a copy of your Medicare card as soon as you receive it, so we can set you up for Medicare Crossover.

» Once you are enrolled in Medicare, they become your

primary insurer and pay the first 80 percent of claims. We pay 80 percent of the remainder.

- » Generally, if Medicare pays a claim, we will also pay.
- » Always give your provider both your Medicare card and your Trust Funds medical card. We cannot pay claims unless they go through Medicare first, as a general rule.

 You only need to enroll in Medicare "A," the hospital, and "B," the doctor. You do not need "D," the drug plan, because our plan covers that.

» Dental coverage is separate when you retire and covered under a different Operating Engineers Plan, Delta Dental. Medicare usually takes your monthly payment to them directly from your Social Security monthly stipend. If you are not on Social Security, they will bill you quarterly.

Be sure to call the Trust Funds Office at (510) 671-8827, if you have specific questions. It is very important to do this right, because if you enroll too late, you may be stuck with the first 80 percent of the bill Medicare was supposed to pay. No one wants that!

Please call (510) 671-8827 to schedule a phone meeting or teleconference regarding your benefits. You may also call your District Office, as they can arrange things. We, at Zenith American Solutions, stand ready to help with all your Trust Funds Fringe Benefits needs and can assist you in any way. Local 3 continues to service the members in every district during the COVID-19 emergency.

Your health and safety is of the utmost concern to Business Manager Dan Reding and the officers of Local 3, as well as all of us at the Trust Funds. We regret any inconvenience and hope to resume the popular face-to-face, in-district visits, very soon.

Sheena's story

They say dynamite comes in small packages, and the woman I'm writing about is no exception. The first time I met Sheena* was on a crisp, sunny morning in April. I arrived at the inpatient facility, notepad in hand, prepared to conduct the Assistance

and Recovery Program's (ARP's) customary predischarge site visit. As I waited on my client's arrival, I considered the woman I was about to meet. Sheena had a turbulent start. A phone call came in to ARP about a month prior that made assessing her needs difficult. Her combination of anger, inebriation and resistance set the stage for careful unraveling. Sheena assured me she did not have a problem with alcohol and that she was only calling because of the insistence of her family. She was adamant that the feedback she was receiving from others about her drinking lacked accuracy, and if she could just get out of pain, everything would be ok. At that time, she was unwilling to take suggestions or entertain the idea of help.

As time rolled on, ARP received phone calls both from her and her family. Each phone call was another puzzle piece falling into place, creating a clearer picture. I learned that physically, life had dealt Sheena a poor hand. She suffers from a medical condition that has no cure. It is progressive, painful and creates roadblocks to daily activities that most of us take for granted. I was told that up until the recent past, Sheena had rarely consumed alcohol, and those who knew her were taken aback by the changes they were seeing as she started to consume more. Chaos ensued, as it often does, and her drinking continued to progress until lines were drawn in the sand. This is when Sheena consented to enter treatment.

I looked up as the door slid open and laid eyes on Sheena for the first time. She walked over and sat across from me and looked at me like we were about to have an old Wild West standoff, even though she was very slight in stature. She had intelligent eyes, a quick wit and a very clear explanation as to why we were all still wrong about her, but she was glad she had been able to attend treatment and had gained a great deal from the program. We played verbal chess for quite a while, and I left the facility wondering where her path would take her, hoping for the best.

The next few months didn't appear to go very smoothly for her or her family, but everyone consistently called and sought solutions. From the outside looking

in, I can only ever guess the reason behind the light

coming on, but it eventually did. Sheena picked up the phone one day to call me, and her excuses were gone. She was done fighting and admitted she could not control her drinking. Her life had become unmanageable. In that one moment, the trajectory of our previous course changed. All the suggestions that had been given without consideration were taken. Sheena began attending 12-step recovery

meetings nightly, she got a sponsor and started putting pen to paper. She also started calling ARP weekly as an accountability tool, and put her mind and effort into forging a new path.

I have watched this woman change so completely in some areas and yet retain the core of what makes her the beautiful person she is. I've watched her lead with humility, as she works daily to repair the relationships effected by her drinking. I've watched her courage, as she faces her medical issues head-on. I've watched her choose to love life, even when it's difficult. I've watched her choose forgiveness instead of resentment. I've watched her persevere, when she wants to give up. I've been blessed to watch her process for a while now, and in all this time, I never hang up the phone without a smile on my face.

Sheena still calls ARP weekly to check-in. She recently called to say she was blown away and so touched by a member of the 12-step

meeting she attends regularly. She wasn't able to attend her regular meeting on one particular week, as a result of a medical procedure, and one of the regulars called to check on her and let her know he was saving her seat.

She laughed and said, "It's a good thing, because it's the only chair in the place where my feet touch the floor."

Her call relayed the positive she found in her current situation and the gratitude she felt around a simple gesture.

There are many stories like this in ARP. I see many people who struggle as Sheena has, and many eventually do find great strength in themselves and the tools available, if they take that first step in admitting they need help. Most people heard about the wildfires that swept through California's North Bay Area last year, but many have moved on, if their lives weren't directly affected. For those families living in Napa/ Sonoma counties and the surrounding areas, "moving on," is not an option. However, crews with Sierra Mountain Construction, Inc. (SMCI) are helping families and their communities safely recover and rebuild, thanks to ongoing tree removal in these sometimes remote areas.

Engineers News recently caught up with a few of these tree removal crews on winding county roads along the north end of Napa's Lake Berryessa near Smittle Creek. Stationed along remote areas, sometimes off-road and on slopes, these 12 crews are responsible for removing the dead, dying and diseased trees along more than 80 miles of county roadways, like Mill Creek Road, and on about 700 private ranch properties. Tree-cutting crews down and slice the fire-ravaged trees and then operators, like Harry Quarles, Lensper "Lance" Tom and Guiseppe Pantano, load the trees onto trucks, which drive them all to way to Chinese Camp, Calif., which has been permitted to receive them. First-step Apprentice Alex Winters operates the sweeper, while veteran Allen Perkett handles the skidsteer. Supervisor Travis Archer oversees these crews, while Gradesetter Logan Jordan assists. Lube Tech Robert Lanning zips from site to remote site, refueling and lubing this equipment, which certainly takes a beating. Operators must also be aware of camping vehicles and tourists, who like to visit these areas during the spring and summer seasons. (All work stops to let cars drive by.)

While some of these operators commute from Redding, Stockton or Manteca, all are happy to be helping these communities move on and keep the traveling public safe from these compromised trees. They all agree that working near Lake Berryessa beats battling traffic near Hwy. 101!

At some of the property sites, operators have carefully placed belongings they find within the tree rubble on tables, so owners can see if anything left has value.

"They are all very respectful and considerate of these people's property and any belongings they find," said Rohnert Park Business Rep. Sal Flores. "This is a beautiful area, and they respect these homeowners who want to return to their properties and begin rebuilding as soon as possible."

It's not certain when crews will finish, as there are about 4,000 marked trees, with more popping up every day. Crews are expected to work more than 100,000 hours over the course of this project, which encompasses Mendocino, Lake, Napa and Sonoma counties. *

Flood of projects kick off work season

Report

From Reno Granite Construction is keeping our members busy on a \$60 million runway project at the Reno-Tahoe International Airport, an \$18 million paving job in Washoe County, the \$1.5 million Stewart Street Water Main project and at the Coeur Rochester mine near Lovelock. In Yerington, Q&D Construction is working on a \$28 million water and sewer rehab project, a \$35 million paving project in Washoe County for the Nevada Department of Transportation (NDOT) and a \$31 million effluent pipeline project at the Truckee Meadows Wastewater Reclamation Facility (TMWRF). In Reno, Ames Construction and **Q&D Construction** continue to work on the first phase of the \$175 million Spaghetti Bowl Express (SBX) project. Sierra Nevada Construction (SNC) is working on a \$12 million sewer and street rehab project in Reno, a \$4.5 million effluent pump station in Washoe County and a \$1.3 million permanent patch program for the City of Reno. Road and Highway Builders (**RHB**) is working on a \$20 million grind and overlay project on I-80 at Rye patch east of Lovelock, a \$16 million grind and overlay project from the Pumpernickel Valley exit to Valmy and performing \$17 million worth of paving Near Schurz.

As we continue to battle the COVID-19 pandemic, please remember to follow all safety protocols. Doing so will help keep you healthy and safe and will ensure that projects are not shut down.


From Elko

The San Francisco Public Utilities Commission's (SFPUC's) \$6 billion Sewer System Improvement Program (SSIP) is generating a lot of work for our members all over the city. In the Financial District, **Anvil Builders** has Foreman **Salvador Jimenez** and Excavator Operator **Martin Briseno** replacing a sewer force main at Embarcadero and Jackson, which serves 350,000 San Franciscans and transports wastewater from northern San Francisco to the Southeast Treatment Plant in the Bayview neighborhood. Across town, on 19th Avenue, **JMB Construction, Inc.** has operators **Jose Hernandez Jr.** and **Nicholas Hernandez Lopez** replacing old sewer and water lines from San Francisco State University (SFSU) to Lincoln. **Cinquini & Passarino, Inc.** is also onsite with Party Chief **Hugo Cruz** and Chainman **Anthony Liccio** laying out some future sidewalk improvements.

Housing continues to be a priority in San Francisco. Off Ocean Avenue near the Excelsior District, **James E. Roberts-Obayashi Corp.** is working on a \$60 million, 93-apartment project. Funding for this all-union project is coming from the AFL-CIO's Housing Investment Trust (HIT). **Pacific States Environmental Contractors, Inc.** is also onsite, with Foreman **David Sullivan** and Excavator Operator **Miguel Rivera**.

Water treatment plant expansion to accommodate region's growth

Report

The Combie Canal replacement project along Bear River has kept Operating Engineers busy for the last two seasons, but it will soon be coming to an end thanks to the hard work of Operating Engineers with **Steve P. Rados, Inc.**

In Roseville, members with **Meyers And Sons**, **Tyrell Resources**, **Teichert**, **Sterling Holloway** and **Jarrett Foundations** are working on the \$12 million westbound onramp project at Atlantic Street on I-80. The project, which is scheduled for completion in the Fall of 2022, was developed in cooperation with the City of Roseville's Public Works Department and received funding from the State Highway Operation and Protection Program's (SHOPP's) Operational Improvements Program. The work involves expanding the width of the on-ramp from one lane to three and replacing the existing Miner's Ravine Bridge to support the newly widened roadway. Once completed, the project will reduce significant traffic backup and improve the operations of local streets and intersections.

Also in Roseville, members with **W. M. Lyles** and **Ward-Henshaw** continue work on the \$78 million Pleasant Grove Waste Water Treatment Plant (WWTP) project. The project will increase plant capacity from 9.5 million gallons per day to 12 million gallons per day, ensuring that the flood of new residents to the area will be able to flush the toilet, do laundry or take a shower without harming the environment. This project, which is scheduled for completion next Spring, started last year and has kept up to 10 members busy (including two apprentices).

When Big Sur received a foot of rain in a 24-hour period, it pushed debris from the Dolan Fire into Hwy. 1's drainage system near Rat Creek, clogging it and creating a backup of water. As a result, Caltrans had to shutdown the highway, and the region is losing \$250,000 a day from tourism. To fix the problem, **Papich Construction** was awarded a \$5 million emergency contract. So far, members like **Wilber Diaz**, **Garrette Emerson** and **Greg Emde** have taken an estimated '70,000 cubic yards of sediment, rocks and trees offsite and will be bringing in 25,000 cubic yards of fill to support a new, two-lane roadway. The crew is currently working to have the highway opened again by early summer. In the meantime, they get to enjoy some great views that are hard to beat!

Shop highlight: Geneva Rock Products in Orem

Address

Geneva Rock Products opened its first shop in 1954 in Pleasant Grove. It had two bays and handled three cement mixers. In 1972, the company built a new shop in Orem with eight bays, including a pull-through lube bay and a paint booth. At the new shop, Local 3 members perform inspections and services for 29 cement mixers, as well as 35 dump trucks and pups, four transport trucks and over 150 pieces of construction equipment, including loaders, blades, pavers, asphalt rollers, dirt rollers, track hoes and more. Local 3 members out of the Orem shop also perform concrete plant rebuilds and repairs, and they tear-down and set-up portable plants. Meanwhile, welders work out of the old shop in the yard and are kept busy rebuilding all the loader buckets and trackhoe buckets. In total, **Geneva Rock Products** employs 35 mechanics, six electricians, three welders and two painters at the shop in Orem.

Geneva Rock Products has grown quite a bit over the years and now has shops in Logan, Layton, Perry, Park City, Salt Lake City, Point of the Mountain, Murray, Taylorville, Tooele, Pelican Point, Payson and Helper, as well as crusher plants throughout the state. Members with the company have been involved in negotiations this year, and Local 3 thanks them for all they do to make our union stronger. We offer special thanks to Orem shop stewards **Ken Hurst** and **Charles Layne** for their ongoing service to their union and their union family.

Based on current membership numbers the minimum number of nominators shall be 200 for each candidate running for office.

Bylaws Article XII, Elections, Section 1(c)

The minimum number of nominators required for District Member of the Executive Board is five (5) Members of the District.

Nomination forms will be available at District Offices on April 14, 2021.

Notice and acceptance or declination of nominee

Bylaws Article XII, Elections, Section 2(g)

The Recording-Corresponding Secretary of the Local Union must notify each candidate of his or her nomination and the Office to which he or she has been nominated. The candidate must return a written acceptance of the nomination to the Recording-Corresponding Secretary, which acceptance must be received by the Recording-Corresponding Secretary within ten (10) days of the date the candidate was notified of the nomination.

Bylaws Article XII, Elections, Section 2(i)

In the event no statement is received by the Recording-Corresponding Secretary on or before ten (10) days from the date the notice was received, provided for in Article XII, Section 2(g), the nominee shall be deemed for all purposes to have declined all nominations for the Offices or Positions for which he or she has been nominated.
