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
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



## Our efforts have an impact

Thanks to everyone who came out to the Semi-Annual Event last month. We had a great turnout, as always, and we really appreciate the membership taking some time out of their weekend to visit with their fellow union members and staff to get more information about their union.

I did touch on politics, which is a necessity to our livelihoods. There is an important Special Election coming up on Nov. 4 in California, which deserves your attention. (More on this can be found on page 11.) If you live in Santa Clara County, you must vote YES ON MEASURE A, as about 300 Local 3 jobs may be lost, unless this measure passes and we can offset the federal budget cuts that have been implemented for the hospital systems in that region. Also, VOTE YES ON PROP. 50, as Texas has re-drawn its voting districts to swing Congress against working people's rights, and other states are doing the same. California is saying no with Prop. 50. As I mentioned, read more about this and the Special Election on page 11 in this edition.


More on how politics impacts our livelihoods: Your Voice of the Engineer (VOTE) volunteers and staff joined forces with the Building Trades at the California state Capitol to urge legislators to continue funding California's High-Speed Rail (HSR). I also touched on this at the Semi-Annual. Thanks to our efforts, the state committed \$1 billion annually from cap-and-trade revenues through 2045. The annual \$1 billion allocation comes from California's capand-invest program, which collects fees from polluting industries. Our lobbyists and the presence of our volunteers at the Capitol played a huge role in making sure this project moves forward. Your efforts have impact!

This edition highlights two important projects that also emphasize the importance of your efforts, not just in politics but in the important work that you do. One is the Harvest Water Project, happening in Sacramento County, which will make it possible to irrigate more than 16,000 acres of farmland, while boosting the reliability of the region's water supply. This is just one example of how the work of OE3 members benefits not just themselves and their families but whole communities. Another important project in this edition is The Point, located near Draper, Utah. This giant 600-acre development will provide this area with affordable housing, jobs, parks, entertainment, restaurants and future light-rail transportation to surrounding areas. It will put this area on the map, while creating thousands of jobs and billions of dollars of revenue for the state. Again, the work Operating Engineers do plays such a major impact on their communities. I can't state that point enough.

As we head into the colder season and some projects begin to wind down, don't forget about all of the free opportunities afforded to you through your union membership at our training centers. Journeylevel operators can get upgrade-training in their home state, or at the International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) Training Center in Crosby, Texas. Call your local training center or your district office for more information. There are two remaining picnics on the schedule, one in Yuba City District 60 on Oct. 12, and one in Hawaii on Dec. 6. Details about these can be found on page 28. Our final round of District Meetings begins in December. We will be focusing more on education and discussion, so plan to attend. These begin at 7 p.m. Schedules can be found on page 28.

Don't forget to check-out Local 3's social media. ## The end game

We have an important Special Election coming up next month that deserves your attention. We hear it from members all of the time, about how they want a break from all of the information they get about politics. I want to stress that we cannot afford to have a break. Educate yourself about what the union is telling you on page 11, so you can make an informed decision. The more we unite, the more power we have as individuals and as a union. Period.

Your officers walk up to a politician and say, "The six of us may vote for you, but what are you going to do for Operating Engineers?" That statement has no power, does it? But if every single member in our union, all 41,000 of you, say, "We are all voting for you, what can you do for us?" Do you see how much influence that has? If we band together and with the other Building Trades, our issues will be ones they can't ignore.

If you're not registered to vote, don't complain, and if you're out in the field, make sure you're spreading accurate information. But

if you're spreading information about politics and you aren't even registered to vote, then you're just wasting everyone's time. You have to be able to vote, and to do that, you have to be registered.

Now, no matter which politician it is, none of them are 100 percent for any one of us, but we support the ones that will put Operating Engineers to work, making wages and benefits for you and your family. Our core issues are making sure our members are able to support themselves and their families, enjoy life and retire with dignity. That's the end game. All of OE3's officers and staff are working to that end. I don't know anyone who is working in the field right now who doesn't have that job because of politics. Whether it's a subdivision

that needs permits, a freeway job or a public employee that has some bureaucratic politician that's too tight to pay them properly, all of these jobs and issues are part of our fight.

Regardless of the chaotic political climate right now, we've got some pretty good stuff going on. Our work hours are going to be close to 36 million, as long as the hours stay up through the rest of the year. That means people are paying into our Health and Welfare and our Pension. If you went to the Semi-Annual, you heard Business Manager Dan Reding talk about some work that's on the chopping block. He mentioned the Central Valley's High Speed Rail (HSR) is losing funding, and this job has 400 operators on it. Why would any of us want that to stop? Every one of those operators working on that job is paying into our Trust Funds and supporting their families. Our Political Department has helped secure more funding for it, but it will continue to be a battle. If they decide to tear it down, I want Operating Engineers to do that work, too! The Sites Reservoir

> in Yuba City District 60 is supposed to start next year. Any one of you could start your career and end it on that job alone, which includes 11 dams and a four-mile bridge. That kind of project doesn't start overnight. It takes years of being engaged in politics.

Those of you who are new to this industry, the apprentices and the new members, these are the things that your union does to ensure you have a good career, and we need your help to do it. We need you to get registered to vote. We need you to step in and get behind the staff when they ask you to come out and support a cause. The end game is clear, and how we get there is together. Let's reach the end game. See you at the next round of meetings in the winter. Stay safe.



## **How to read your Pension statement**

For all Pension Plan participants, your Pension statement provides important retirement information. Pay particular attention to the following information:

- Number of hours reported for you for the Plan year indicated. Compare these hours with your records, as they are an important factor in determining your Pension benefit.
- Credit earned during the Plan year and the dollars added to your Pension for the year.
- Your total future credits and the monthly benefit through the Plan year, which is payable at full retirement age 65 or for a service
- Important messages regarding your Pension benefits.

#### **Service Retirement: Rule of 85**

Members whose Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA) offers a Local 3 Pension, will retire under one of the following retirement rules, upon eligibility:

- **Normal Retirement**
- **Early Retirement**
- **Disability Retirement**
- Service Retirement

This month, I am highlighting the most popular form of a Service Retirement, the "Rule of 85." This was implemented by the Trustees as a Plan improvement many years ago and is a reward for members who got into Local 3 early and remained contributing members for their entire careers. As a result, these members can retire with a full-service Pension before the Normal Retirement Pension at age 65.

To be eligible to retire under the "Rule of 85," the following is required:

- You must be age 55 and vested.
- You must not have previously retired under an Early Retirement Pension.
- Your age and Pension credits must add up to the number 85. (A total of 10 years of related credit under another Operating Engineers Local or another trade may be counted.)

You must comply with a work test:

- ♦ You must have worked at least 2,000 hours for one or more contributing employers in the 72 months immediately preceding your Pension Effective Date.
- ♦ You must have worked and contributed at least 350 hours in the year you retire or one of the two Plan years immediately preceding your Pension Effective Date.

If you have questions about calculations and eligibility, it is best to call us. We can do the math and provide detailed answers and projections. As you approach your all-important retirement date, facts and knowledge are essential.

- Overtime pay for Distribution System Operator (DSO)
- ► Comp time for the Maintenance Group
- > Discipline process to be made cleaner and clearer
- Martin Luther King Jr. holiday observed

We will keep you posted on when we finalize this Memorandum of Understanding (MOU).



## SF City Rec and Parks members receive award; save jobs

This summer, Local 3 public employees with the City and County of San Francisco Recreation and Parks Department were honored with the prestigious William Hammond Hall Awards at McLaren Lodge in San Francisco, Calif. Our members were acknowledged for the work they do in maintaining the public parks and golf courses of San Francisco.

Their efforts have come full-circle, as not that long before this ceremony, many of these members had engaged in a campaign to keep their jobs in maintaining the Harding Park Golf Course. City officials had wanted to outsource this work to unskilled workers, citing budget deficits as the reason.

We are Local 3, and we don't back down. Local 3 members joined a coalition with the Teamsters, Building Trades and other Bay Area unions and attended several budget and finance-committee hearings to oppose this proposition, as the outcome would have had profound impacts on their livelihoods, including the loss of their jobs.

After we met with City officials and the leadership of the Recreation and Parks Department, it was agreed that alternative means to solve the budget issue needed to be found,

and privatization was out of the question. The Harding Park Golf Course would not be outsourced, and our members remain employees of the City to this day!

It's also fitting that Harding Park Golf Course turned 100 years old this summer. Named after President Warren Harding, an avid golfer, the course opened on July 18, 1925. That same month, 100 years later, our members rightfully received awards for maintaining the legacy of this great park. Operating Engineers Local 3 will continue to advocate for our members who uphold and maintain such a great legacy. Congratulations to them on this prestigious award and for having the courage to fight for what they deserve.





## A local crisis, a local solution

Hospitals across Santa Clara County are in real danger. In July 2025, Congress passed House Resolution (HR 1), a sweeping federal law that gutted billions from healthcare programs nationwide, which was subsequently signed by the President. Santa Clara County has long relied on federal funding to keep its health system afloat, receiving approximately \$3.5 billion each year, with Medi-Cal as the largest single source. However, under HR 1, that support is disappearing. The law imposes harsh cuts and new barriers to care, including work requirements for Medi-Cal, an enrollment freeze for undocumented adults on state-funded Medi-Cal and new monthly premiums for the most vulnerable. These changes are not theoretical. They are already in motion.

Without action, hospitals will close. Emergency rooms will shut their doors. Mental health services will stop. Life-saving services – trauma care, cancer treatment, mental health care – will vanish. Our members will lose jobs. That's not a prediction. In response, the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors placed Measure A, a temporary 5/8 cent sales tax, on the Nov. 4, 2025, Special Election ballot. Measure A will:

- Raise \$330 million annually to soften the blow of the \$1 billion federal cut
- ► Keep local hospitals open and core services operating
- Protect access to care for hundreds of thousands of residents
- Last for five years, with strict oversight and independent audits
- ► Ensure every dollar stays in Santa Clara County

County Employees Management Association (CEMA)/OE3 members who are registered voters in Santa Clara County need to **Vote YES on Measure A**. Voters who are not registered must do so, so their voices can be heard. Without action, core services will be slashed. Clinics will close. Wait times will spike. Everyone, regardless of insurance status, will feel the consequences. For our CEMA/OE3 members and other unionized county employees, **jobs will be lost. This is a local answer to a federal crisis we did not create.** Save services, save jobs and vote YES on Measure A on or before Nov. 4, 2025. 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## CA Nov. 4 Special Election: What it means to Operating Engineers

**MORE THAN 300 LOCAL 3 MEMBERS** WILL LOSE EMPLOYMENT, ACCESS TO **HEALTHCARE AND THEIR RETIREMENT** IF THIS DOES NOT PASS



## **VOTE YES ON MEASURE A**

(SANTA CLARA COUNTY)

If you are a voter in Santa Clara County, take note: The White House recently gutted funding in the amount of \$1 billion a year for hospitals, which serve our community and employ hundreds of our members. Unless we vote YES ON MEASURE A, hospitals will close. Emergency rooms will shut their doors. Mental health services will stop. Life-saving services - trauma care, cancer treatment - will vanish. More than 300 Local 3 members will lose employment, access to healthcare and their retirement. In response to this crisis, the Santa Clara County Board of Supervisors placed Measure A on the Special Election ballot. If passed, it will raise \$330 million annually and soften the blow of the \$1 billion federal cut, keep local hospitals open, maintain core services and protect access to care (and jobs) for hundreds of thousands of residents. Save lives, jobs and medical competency in Santa Clara County. VOTE YES ON MEASURE A.

## **VOTE YES ON PROP. 50**

(ELECTION RIGGING RESPONSE ACT)

The current White House Administration should know better than to mess with the working people of California, where 15.1 million people belong to a union. (It is one of the few states that still measures its union population in the millions.) So, when Texas' anti-union politicians, at the urging of the president, decided to re-draw the state's district voting maps to control Congress, California said, "No! We won't be bullied." California is fighting back against this egregious threat to democracy with PROP. 50. **VOTE YES ON PROP. 50** to prevent this hostile takeover of the federal government and protect your union rights, your jobs and your wages. If we do nothing in response to these efforts, other anti-union leaders will do the same and diminish the votes of union members across the country. These efforts are part of a larger plan to rig the 2026 election. It ends with California.

Despite all of this, Prop. 50 affirms California's commitment to national redistricting reform - retaining California's Citizen Redistricting Commission for the regular redistricting after the 2030 census and declaring it state policy to support the use of fair, nonpartisan redistricting commissions nationwide.

> The final district maps are available to view now and would be included in the constitutional amendment that would go before voters, ensuring they have the final say. Let's protect the voting rights for all of California and its millions of union members. VOTE YES ON PROP. 50.



Thanks to the efforts of OE3 members, the \$321 million Harvest Water project is set to transform southern Sacramento County, where decades of groundwater decline have threatened farms, habitats and entire ecosystems. With the installation of the infrastructure needed to transport 50,000 acre-feet of recycled water each year (about 16 billion gallons), the project will make it possible to irrigate more than 16,000 acres of farmland in Sacramento County while, restoring groundwater, boosting the reliability of the region's water supply, protecting habitats and restoring ecosystems.

Earlier this year, crews with Mountain Cascade, Inc. began the work of laying thousands of feet of new pipeline, which will carry recycled water from the EchoWater Resource Recovery Facility in Elk Grove to farms in the surrounding area.

"Right now, we're putting in a 66-inch water line for the Harvest Water project and running 5,000 feet of pipe down to the farmers," explained Superintendent Kevin Glaze. "We have a second phase starting soon that goes into the sewer treatment plant."

Thanks to the project, OE3 apprentices are gaining valuable hands-on experience in the process.

"I was an Ironworker for 12 years, and that was when I was really young," explained Apprentice Ashley Sondrini. "I'm not young anymore, so I picked something else that's a little less physical ... I wanted to go through another apprenticeship, because you can never really stop learning, and if you're going to be in the trades of any kind, union is the way to go. The benefits are great. The training is top of the line. It's a lot more safe, and the money's there."





Inspector Rachel Ward with Construction Testing Services, Inc. was also onsite, ensuring quality standards are met at each step of this important project.

"If they put it together, I come out and tell them whether they did it right, and I give an explanation on what was done right or wrong," she said. "I just try to keep everything in line."

In addition to employing a variety of Operating Engineers and helping farmers in the region, the Harvest Water project will raise groundwater levels by up to 35 feet over 15 years, adding 370,000 acre-feet of storage. That's about one-third the capacity of nearby Folsom Lake. The project will also sustain more than 5,000 acres of river habitat and improve conditions for local wildlife species.

Thanks to \$291.8 million in state funding from the Water Quality, Supply and Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2014 (which was supported by OE3 and it's Voice of the Engineer (VOTE) volunteers), as well as \$30 million from the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, the Harvest Water project is another example of how the work of OE3 members carries numerous benefits to individuals and communities. In this case, those benefits include more reliable water infrastructure, healthier farms, restored ecosystems and good-paying union jobs for OE3 apprentices and journeymen alike. \*\*

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Operating Engineers are a part of something big. Yes, they are a part of the biggest construction trades local in North America, Operating Engineers Local 3, but they are a part of something else, as equally impressive. They are a part of making massive impacts on their communities through the essential work and services they provide. See, they're not just placing a pipe or moving dirt. These may be their immediate tasks, but the bigger picture, THE POINT is – pipe by pipe and bucket by bucket – they are building things that will improve the lives and communities from which they come from.

This is true for every project an Operating Engineer walks on, and it's particularly true for a rare development happening near Draper, Utah, appropriately called *The Point*. The Point is a 600-acre development, which is being referred to as a tech-hub community, which includes not only offices and hotels but affordable housing, retail centers, dining options, parks and entertainment. But this particular development is unusual. Some have called it, "A minicity." Others have said, "It's one of the most important quality-of-life opportunities in Utah history," which may be because it's in a community with just 17,000 residents (Bluffdale, Utah), a number which will surely increase. Also, the project is the state's largest redevelopment and is entirely owned by the state. (The site was once used to house the old Utah State Prison.)

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"This project is the first publicly owned land, where the state is partially funding the initial construction and then will lease the property back to the vendors," said OE3 Business Agent Jason Madsen. "Over time, the state will recoup its initial investment of taxpayer money and then earn profits that will be used for the community."

So, who are the operators responsible for making this innovative, first-of-its-kind redevelopment happen? They are OE3 journeymen and apprentices working for a joint-venture between Geneva Rock and W. W. Clyde. *Engineers News* visited them this summer, as they were working on the underground portion of the project, sewer and water, as well as laying about six miles of pipe. Crews have also been providing heavy excavation work. More visible, above-ground work should start next summer.

Our operators are working on the first two phases, and when it's all said and done, this mecca will include over 3,300 multi-family houses, a 60,000 square-foot entertainment venue, 10 miles of sidewalks and trails, helicopter-like drones to transport people to the airport, as well as light-rail to connect Utah and Salt Lake counties. Not bad for a place that used to house a prison, and for a project that is set to generate thousands of jobs and billions of dollars of revenue for the state.

But that's what Operating Engineers do. They innovate, renovate, rebuild and renew. And that's THE POINT. \*

#### Operators fix 'Scour Critical' bridge in Half Moon Bay

In San Francisco, excavator operators **Alberto Gutierrez** and **Jesus Cisneros** are working for **Bauman Landscape and Construction** on the Mission Street Rehabilitation Project, which includes demolition and replacement of sidewalks, curbs and gutters and installing new Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)-compliant ramps.

Operators **Sean Burke** and **Marcus Stewart** are working for **Fontenoy Construction**, installing a 20-inch, ductile iron waterline at a depth of 15 feet on 23<sup>rd</sup> Street, ending at Illinois Street. Also on 23<sup>rd</sup> Street, **R & B Demolition** has operators **John Dooling** and **Tyler Dooling** working on a wall demolition project. The crew is preparing the site for **DeSilva Gates**, which will be performing a 55-foot-deep, mass excavation for a multi-story parking structure.

In Visitacion Valley, **Phoenix Electric** is preparing to expand its crew for the Sunnydale Housing Project, as the company will be focusing on the infrastructure phase. Excavator Operator **Uriel Reyes** is currently onsite.

In the Richmond District, **Cratus**, **Inc**. is providing sewer and water-system upgrades to improve wastewater flow, water pressure and reliability for homes, businesses and firefighting. The project includes 1.4 miles of sewer and 6.7 miles of water mains. Currently, the project has Foreman **Jorge Martinez**, Excavator Operator **Sergio Cervantes**, Loader Operator **Jose De Alba Gonzalez** and Apprentice **Sergio Cervantes** Jr. The project should be completed at the end of next year.

In San Mateo County, **Teichert** is in South San Francisco paving at Sneath Lane and South Linden. Operators onsite include

Gradechecker Matthew Hartman, Working Foreman Hector Munoz, Roller Operator Tyler Bilse and Excavator Operator Refugio Munoz. BKF, Inc. is also onsite with Party Chief Francisco Espinoza and Chainman Luis Uriarte.

In Half Moon Bay, **Disney Construction** is working on the Pilarcitos Creek Bridge project at Hwy. 1 and Hwy. 92. The bridge has been identified as "Scour Critical," which means erosion around the foundation is jeopardizing stability.

Superintendent **Sean Pipkin**, Working Foreman **Mark Modena** and excavator operators **Weijie Zhao** and **Clayton Skilling** are under the bridge removing silt from around the piers and installing 3,000 yards of rip-rap and 2,000 yards of clean streambed material are onsite.

## Calistoga gets major improvements

Report

In Fairfield, **Kiewit** has started the westbound I-80 truck scale project. The more than \$270 million project includes three, three-year phases. The first phase includes grading, underground and pad work, the second involves construction of new facilities and the third phase includes new bridges, roads and white-paving. This project will fill a lot of seats for Local 3! **Granite Rock** continues widening Foothill Road into Pleasants Valley Road. This project will run late into the fall season.

In Dixon, **Lund Construction** is widening West A Street, which is a direct result of the new housing track being built in the area.

The community of Calistoga continues to see major improvements in 2025, including new track and field improvements at Calistoga Junior Senior High School (CJSHS) and road rehab improvements on Lake Street. **Argonaut Constructors** is heading the road improvements, which involves full-depth reclamation. Operators are performing a 12-inch pulverization from existing AC, then a 6-inch grind and off-haul at a 40-foot width. Shoulders will get a 20-inch grind, the center of the roadway will get a 13-inch FDR section and then 138 tons of cement get mixed into the 13-inch section. Finally, paving will

plug the roadway at 4 inches and then do the final 2-inch AC cap across the full width of the road.

Keller-North America, Inc. is constructing a single-story, modular, 5,760-square-feet building at Calistoga Elementary School. The building will be at the back of the campus, adjacent to the Napa River. Due to the presence of liquefiable soil, Deep Soil Mixing (DSM) is required to reinforce the ground and limit the structure's movement toward the river during a strong seismic event. The company is installing 3-foot diameter DSM columns. DSM construction involves using high torque equipment to mechanically mix grout with native soils to create a nearly homogeneous mixture of weak concrete called *soilcrete*. The result is stabilized, soil-mixed columns.

Much of this ongoing work gets funded through politics, including Measure

T, which Voice of the Engineer (VOTE) volunteers helped pass. This is just more evidence that when we are politically involved, we prosper!

#### New companies organized in district

We have signed several new contractors within our district, thanks to the work of your Organizing Department, district staff and affiliate entities, NorCal Construction Industry Compliance (NCIC) and the Foundation for Fair Contracting (FFC). These new companies include AGD General Engineering, Empire Earthworks, Freedom Equipment Repair, J & R Field Services, JAW, Inc., Peters Excavating, Precision Excavating & Grading and Schaefer Engineering. With the addition of these signatories, our members will have more work opportunities!

Rege Construction is working at Anderson High School in Boonville on a \$6.3 million track and field renovation. The company is also working at Hwy. 253, east of Ukiah, on an emergency slide-repair, is continuing private work at the Geyser's power plants and has another private project in Covelo for the Round Valley Tribes (a new wastewater treatment pond valued at \$3.1 million.)

Gordon N. Ball, Inc. recently finished an \$8 million bridge replacement on Old Geyser Road in Cloverdale and began the more than \$6 million slide project on Skaggs Springs Road.

Myers & Sons started a \$30 million emergency slide repair just north of Westport on Hwy. 1 and another \$80 million was approved for rock revetment work to place rip-rap and large boulders along the hillside and shoreline. The revetment will be about 2,000 feet-long by 38-40 feet-high to prevent future erosion and slide-outs from the high ties.

Granite Construction is providing all of the surface and underground work

on a \$6.2 million project with main contractor Hensel Phelps. The company also started the \$3.1 million fourth phase of the Redwood Trail, which runs through Ukiah. Other projects for the company include an emergency slide-repair just north of Hwy. 1 and a few paving jobs in Longvale and on Hwy. 162.

Bay Cites Paving and Grading and Myers & Sons have started the \$145 million North County Corridor (NCC) project. (The total project cost is \$210 million and will be completed in 2028.) The first phase of the project involves constructing 2.3 miles of the NCC, which is an 18-mile, four-lane, divided expressway in northern Stanislaus County. Phase 1 begins at Claribel Road and Oakdale Road and extends east to Claribel Road and Claus Road. The accesscontrolled corridor will include a wide median and grade separations over Roselle Avenue, Terminal Avenue and the Burlington Northern Santa Fe (BNSF) Railroad tracks, eliminating the existing at-grade rail-crossing. The first phase also includes realigning Claribel Road to include a grade-separation over the railroad, along with bicycle and pedestrian improvements. There are eight total bridges on the project. Bay Cities Paving and Grading expects to be in full-swing on this project by the time this goes to press, and around 20 operators will continue working on it through the winter.

At the other end of all this work and a long, successful career in Local 3 is retirement! In 1993, Local 3 member **Geary Crandell** went to work for **Gradex Paving and Grading**. A few years later, he went to work for **George Reed**, **Inc**. and eventually became a paving operator. #### Local partnerships make getting work easier

The gravel harvest season has come to an end, as the deadline for being out of the water is Sept. 20. That means we're heading into the slower season, and jobs will start to slow down. **West Coast Contractors** started work back at Rowdy Creek, and depending on weather, that project will finish soon.

American Pavement Systems, Inc. (APS) recently completed a \$2.5 million California Department of Transportation chip-seal and road maintenance project on Hwy. 96. APS came into Hoopa Valley with a 25-person crew, 13 of which were Operating Engineers, and worked with the Hoopa Valley Tribal Nation to secure jobs for local tribal members. In four days, APS was able to chip-seal just under 10 miles of four-lane roadway, including all approaches. Quality union

workers, overall product and the ability to work with local Tribal Nations, are extremely important factors in companies being able to win bids, employ Local 3 members and secure work in District 40. Seal-coating and chip-seal projects are less expensive ways to maintain roadways without having to demo out all the old asphalt and possibly regrade/treat the base material. This allows the state, counties or cities to maintain larger stretches of road for less and focus on replacing the worst sections of road. While everyone wants to drive on smoother roads, it's even better when you know it was done by Local 3 members, like Operator **Dana Eberle**.

Don't forget to get on the Out of Work List (OOWL), if you get laid-off. The Employment Development Department (EDD) is checking more regularly on those applying for unemployment benefits, and we want to make sure you're covered. Also, as the season slows, think about getting some extra training. If you've racked up 350 hours with a contributing employer in the last year, you can sign up for training at the Operating Engineers Local 3 Journeyman and Apprentice Training Center (OE3 JATC) in Sloughhouse, Calif. Call (916) 354-2029 for details and about signing up to get your Class A driver's license. The training center will hold the class, once they have enough people signed up. You can also go to the International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) Training Center in Crosby, Texas. Training makes getting a dispatch and keeping a job a lot easier. Call the Hall for more information.

### PLAs create work in district

San Jose has been busy with several projects in the downtown area. One of these is the Guadalupe River Bridge Project, began last year. Valley Water and Cal-Train are replacing the 90-year-old, wooden, northbound bridge with a 265-foot concrete bridge. Walsh Construction has 10-20 Operating Engineers working on this project, including Sam Miller, Ernest Whisenant, Ramon Arredondo, Juan Martinez, Johnnie Bottley and third-step Apprentice Jarod Dillard. Drilled-shaft subcontractor Legacy Foundations is also onsite installing eight oscillated piles and tripping 47,000-pound rebar cages and concrete to reinforce the work. Legacy Foundations' Superintendent Xavier Alexander explained that his crew consists entirely of Operating Engineers.

"I would rather have it that way than hire other crafts," he said.

King Crane and Jos. J. Albanese, Inc. have also been onsite throughout the season to assist with crane work and concrete pumping operations, respectively.

Redgwick Construction has been working on San Carlos Street for the Urban Village Street Scape project. Operators are demo-ing intersection corners, installing Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) ramps and median islands. This project is expected to last through the winter and be completed by June of 2026. This work aligns with the City of San Jose's commitment to improving the downtown corridor for pedestrians and bicyclists by installing more bike lanes throughout First through Sixth streets and the San Fernando Corridor. Work will be performed under San Jose's Project Labor Agreement (PLA) with Sposeto and Redgwick Construction.

Another PLA will be taking place on the east side of San Jose, thanks to Measure T (a local measure that OE3 Voice of the Engineer (VOTE) volunteers helped pass). The \$13.5 million Local Streets Resurfacing Project will be performed by MCK Services. Other downtown corridor improvements include Hwy. 280's sound wall around Hwy. 87 with Granite Construction.

## New company understands what it means to be organized

What exactly do we mean when we say "organizing?" It has nothing to do with cleaning up. For a union, organizing means engaging in the process of helping workers form or join a union to negotiate with employers for improved working conditions, wages and benefits. It can also mean signing an entire company, so its employees can enjoy those rights. When we say, "Organizing is the life blood of the union," we mean that without new members and new employers to employ our members, the union would eventually die. The more members Local 3 has, the more power we all have in our agreements, our working conditions and our access to jobs.

Every district has an organizer, and these employees are *your* staff. They work closely with the districts and you to sign-up new members and new companies (top-down organizing). Their jobs are not easy. Sometimes, they get doors slammed in their faces and run-off jobs, as they seek to educate employers and workers about the value of unionism. They are persistent and must keep their eye on the goal: Improving workers' lives. Some workers and companies will never see the light, but some begin to understand, and they are usually grateful for the decision, once they see that becoming signatory to Local 3 affords them all kinds of opportunities. For companies, this includes access to a skilled workforce, a greater market share and lower administrative costs. For the workers who get organized, Local 3 membership means their entire wage package (including

retirement, Annuity and healthcare benefits) will be about 30-40 percent higher than whatever straight salary they made working non-union. They also receive free training, access to more jobs and countless other union benefits.

Core Dynamics Ground Penetrating Radar (GPR) Owner Joseph Moreno is a great example of what being "organized" can mean. Local 3 signed Core Dynamics GPR this summer. Stockton District Organizer Brent Hewitt explained the value of being signatory to Local 3 to Joseph, and today, the company is seeing results. Now, Core Dynamics GPR not only has greater access to jobs and networking opportunities with other companies, but Joseph and his employees will now have access to lifetime benefits for himself and his family.

Core Dynamics is one of the few companies utilizing GPR, which uses radar pulses to image the subsurface. GPR is a non-intrusive method of surveying the subsurface to inspect underground utilities, such as concrete, asphalts, metals, pipes, cables and more. It can detect anomalies in the floors and walls of buildings. The company's unique technology coupled with a Local 3 membership has created better opportunities for the company and our membership. Welcome, Core Dynamics GPR, and if you are a contractor and in need of GPR, help support them, as they are now signatory to Operating Engineers. 




**THE WHO** General Contractor Snelson Pipelines and subcontractor Brotherton Corporation

**THE WHAT** Brotherton is boring 72 feet under the base of the Eel River in Rio Dell, Calif and pulling back 3,067 feet of 4-inch steel gas line, while Snelson is providing open trench work, installation and connections for the finished product.

**THE WHY** The four-inch gas transmission line is for Humboldt County and transitions into a 6-inch line at the northern end of the connection point. The old gas line will be cleaned, capped and left in place until the retrofit for the Eel River Bridge occurs (more work for Operating Engineers).

**THE DETAILS** Brotherton is using a 650,000-pound directional drill, which refers to how much weight the mast of the drill rig is able to drill steel or pull product back. The company is also doing an additional 130 feet of four-inch steel gas line using guided auger boring, which is when a drill rig pushes a hollow casing through the ground. After the casing is installed, the casing is then bored and reamed to remove the spoils and leave a hollow casing or mini drilled shaft. (Brotherton was only 1/8 of an inch off of the target for where they would enter the receiving pit, as they were in the bore plan.)
