It is an honor to lead Local 3

Thank you all for joining me, your officers and staff at the Semi-Annual. You can find a two-page spread of photos and details about the event on pages 12-13. International Union of Operating Engineers (IUOE) General President John L. Downey also attended and discussed all that's happening for the IUOE. If you missed this important information about the State of YOUR Union, I have provided key details below.

- * **Our training centers are all doing well, with California's new covered dig fully operational now, while facilities are being moved from the original site to the new one. The OE3 Apprenticeship Trust Fund now owns a new training facility in Morgan, Utah, and that is also fully operational. The Nevada and Utah training centers continue to train based on the demand, with classes ranging from forklift-training to First Aid.**
- * **Huge projects are on the books this year, such as Fresno District 50's \$100 billion High-Speed Rail (HSR) project, Nevada District 11's \$3 billion Lithium Thacker Pass, Utah's \$1.3 billion commuter rail and Hawaii's two \$15 billion naval facilities' projects.**
- * **Through 2025, our Organizing Department signed 81 employers to the Master Agreement (a five-year record) and created 418 dispatches as a result of these agreements.**
- * **Our membership numbers, including applicants, are at 40,826, which is an increase of more than 1,000 members since last year.**
- * **We've negotiated some great agreements from 2025-2026, some of which include the Tech Engineers, Crane Rental and Testing and Inspection Master Agreements in California, as well as the Tech Engineers Master Agreement in Nevada.**
- * **Through Dec. 31, 2025, we paid more than \$437.9 million in Pension checks to our Retirees. Our Pension Fund total (invested) is at \$5.88 billion. Our Pension work hours for the 12 months of 2025 were at 38.6 million. These are the highest work hours we have seen, since before the Great Recession. To understand the value of this benefit, note that we pay our Retirees about \$36.7 million each month!**
- * **Through Dec. 31, 2025, the total fund assets of our CA Active Health and Welfare Funds are at \$740.2 million. That's about 15.39 months of reserves for the CA Plan. The total fund assets of our Health and Welfare Funds for our CA Retirees through Dec. 31, 2025, are at \$286.4 million, which is about 20.81 months of reserves.**

This edition includes the union's endorsements, at the time of print, for the upcoming Primary Elections, happening June 2 for California, June 9 for Nevada and June 23 for Utah. These can be found on pages 14-15. Check online (oe3.org) and in the mail for updates to these, as election days draw closer. Register to vote, pay attention to these endorsements and VOTE union. Each endorsement is the result of your district's member-elected Political Action Committees' (PACs') interview process with local candidates, as well as our Political Department's research on candidates and measures at the federal level. If you are interested in doing more for Local 3's political purposes, consider joining our Voice of the Engineer (VOTE) program, which will have many opportunities this year for you to get connected with other members, local politics and staff. Every hour of time you donate goes toward rewards. See page 29 for more details.

I also want to make special mention of our recent apprenticeship graduates from the Northern Nevada Training Center. These new journey-level Operating Engineers have reached a major milestone in their careers. The sky is the limit for what they can achieve. Find photos and more information about this important ceremony on page 25.

On page 27, you will see a Save the Date for the Tradeswomen Build Nations (TWBN) event happening in October in Houston, Texas. Local 3 is again holding a contest for women Operating Engineers, and winners will receive free entry, travel, lodging and meals for this event. Contest applications will be available next month, so keep an eye out here and on social media for more details.

It is such an honor to lead this union. It is a privilege to meet with you at District/Retiree Meetings and Semi-Annual Events. Thanks for participating in your union, and I will have the opportunity to see more of you at our next round of meetings and upcoming picnics (details for these events can be found on pages 26 and 28).

Power over our benefits

Many of you have been asking about the benefits outlined in your contracts. It's important to ask these questions so you understand what your union membership provides for you. Apprentices especially can feel overwhelmed by all the information they're learning when they first join, but knowing this information is important from day one.

A common source of confusion is the Health and Welfare hour bank system. In short, hours you work each calendar month are added to a "bank," which is just a running total. Each month, 120 hours are subtracted from your total in order to maintain your coverage. You can bank up to 960 hours, so you can keep your healthcare during the slower season.

For example, if you have 500 hours in your bank and work 160 hours during the month, your total comes to 660. Once 120 hours for coverage are subtracted, you will end the month with 540 hours in your hour bank. Say the next month there is a lot of rain, and your hours go down to 60. Those 60 bring your total up from 540 to 600. 120 hours will still get subtracted, so you will end that month with 580 hours. Simply put, if you work more than 120 hours per month, your banked total goes up, until you hit 960. If not, it goes down until you hit zero.

Another important benefit is our Pension. Our Pension Plan relies on credits calculated by the hours you work annually, depending on your contract. Once you have been a continuous member and hit the annual credit hours for five years, you become "vested" in the Pension, which means you become eligible for monthly checks once you retire. Your employer pays into the Pension Plan for you on

every paycheck you receive. We have never missed a Pension check to our Retirees, even during hard financial times, such as the Great Recession in 2008.

Via our dues, each one of us who is eligible for the plans, pays into the Health and Welfare and Pension Trust Funds (which are managed by a Board consisting of union and employer reps) and then receives a benefit that is greater than what we put in as individuals. With this system, you can take responsibility for your and your family's health and financial security and help your union brothers and sisters do the same. The bottom line is this: We OWN our Health and Welfare and Pension Plans, and we are proud of that. As a union, we have the control over where our hard-earned money goes.

What does that really mean, though?

It means having fair, union representation in the process of your healthcare claim payments and future (or current, for our Retirees) Pension checks.

It means not having to pay a middleman just to see a doctor.

It means the right to a financially-secure retirement at the end of your career.

Ultimately, our Health and Welfare and Pension plans are just more examples of the difference union membership makes. Each of us keeps these funds strong with the hard work we put in every day. 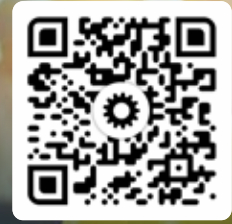

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²To be eligible for Strike Relief, you must meet the following requirements: (1) you must have worked at least 20 hours per week during the 30-day period before the official strike; (2) you must be a cardholder for at least one year; (3) your account must be in good standing; (4) you must be on strike or lockout for 30 or more consecutive days within the last six months. Strike relief will defer your monthly minimum payment for up to 3 months from when you begin your strike.

³OE Federal will return 1% of the gross interest you pay annually on your VISA account(s) to a charity selected by your Local Union. Your Union (including members & family members) must accumulate \$50 or more in benefits each calendar year for a donation to be made. Individual members and Unions do not receive a tax benefit from the donations made by the Credit Union through this program.

2026 Pre-Retirement Phone-in Classes

Good news for part-time workers at Clovis Transit

Under Assembly Bill (AB) 1484, part-time/temporary workers who do the same work as full-time workers can now join the union! This proves once again that politics, including legislation, have real consequences for working people.

Thanks to AB 1484, last year, part-time Clovis Transit bus drivers and transit van drivers joined the full-time bus drivers to form one contract. Members went into negotiations in 2025, and both part-time and full-time bus-driver groups received a 9.24 percent raise for 2025! Part-time van drivers received a 6 percent raise in 2025. Part-time workers also received paid benefits and a new limited disciplinary/grievance process.

Also, under AB 1484, when a part-time worker leaves and goes to work for another City, the union has access to when and why they left, which helps with grievances and determining the best way to represent members going forward.

I would like to thank Clovis Transit Chapter President Kenneth Lee and Chapter Vice President Stacey Leggett for their hard work in getting this contract done. Their efforts prove that we are stronger when we can all come together as one!

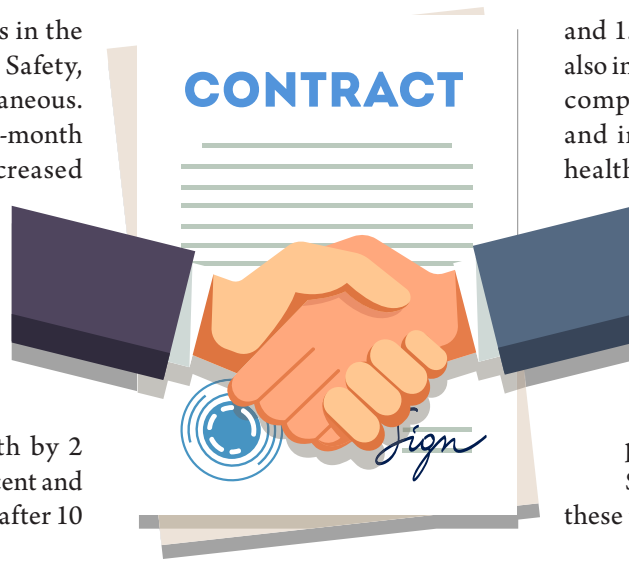

New contracts for all City of Corning units

OE3 represents four bargaining units in the City of Corning: Management, Public Safety, Police and Fire Dispatchers and Miscellaneous. The Management Unit settled on an 18-month contract in which their base wage increased by 2.5 percent. In addition to the salary increase, longevity pay, deferred compensation match and City healthcare contributions were all increased. Our members receive longevity pay after 10 years and 15 years of continuous employment with the City. This contract increased both by 2 percent, so employees now receive 4 percent and 7 percent increases to their base salaries after 10



and 15 years of service, respectively. The City also increased its match to the employee deferred compensation accounts to \$90 per month and increased the City contribution toward healthcare premiums by \$65 each month. At the start of this contract, the City will pay \$2,090 each month per employee toward premium costs.

The Public Safety, Police and Fire Dispatchers and Miscellaneous units all agreed to similar changes to their contracts: the same increase to longevity pay and a total healthcare contribution of \$2,090 per member. The term for each of these three contracts is 12 months.

OE3 member running for Congress

2026 is another hot election year, and California politics have drawn more attention than usual with Gov. Gavin Newsom set to finish his final term. This opens the door for other leaders to step into the highest seat in the state. Some candidates for governor, like former Los Angeles mayor Antonio Villagairosa, have held elected offices previously, while others will be vacating their current elected offices in pursuit of other goals, creating an opportunity for former OE3/County Employees Management Association (CEMA) member, Dr. Aisha Wahab, to run.

Dr. Aisha Wahab has long dedicated her life to public service. Whether in her professional capacity as an employee for the County of Santa Clara, or in her elected capacity as Hayward City Councilmember and now California State Senator, Wahab has demonstrated a strong commitment to the work she has been given and consistent delivery on the policy issues she has promised to tackle. Now, Aisha is running for Congress in California's 14th Congressional District, which includes the cities of Fremont, Pleasanton, Livermore, Union City, Dublin, San Leandro and Hayward. Wahab's success

in this race would mean a voice for labor in Congress and the political support OE3 and the whole union needs to get construction projects funded.

OE3/CEMA give their enthusiastic endorsement of Dr. Aisha Wahab for Congress, and we ask that all California members vote in this year's primary election on June 2, regardless of whether Wahab is on your ballot. A seat in Congress is not just for a vote in the House of Representatives, it is for a leader who understands and fights against the challenges working people face every day. Parx Crew Pride

The small community of Arcata, Calif., sits among the redwood forests of what is often referred to as Northern California's Lost Coast. In addition to being home to California State Polytechnic University, Humboldt (Cal Poly Humboldt), the town is known for its community forest, trail systems, parks and other public spaces, all of which are maintained – and sometimes built – by Operating Engineers working for the City of Arcata's Parks, Facilities and Natural Resources Division.

"From what I've been told, we have more parks per capita than any other town in California, so we're pretty busy," said Senior Maintenance Worker Russell "Rusty" Plocher. "We handle everything... Our crew is fairly small, but we get it done."

On the day *Engineers News* spoke with Rusty, he was mowing the grass at the Arcata Plaza in the center of town, while two of his co-workers replaced old Douglas fir slats that had been placed between the plaza's concrete walkways around 20 years ago.

"They're replacing them with redwood, as part of an improvement project that we've been working on all week," said Plocher. "Just making everything look pretty out here, so a regular day in Arcata for us."

This work is only a fraction of the ongoing services these OE3 members provide local residents and visitors.

"My station, normally, is the Arcata Sports Complex," Rusty explained. "I take care of about 33 acres of green space – two softball fields, two full-size soccer fields, and then a youth-size soccer field and a football field."

"We provide general maintenance of pretty much every green space around town," he added. "If it's green, we take care of it!"

This includes keeping vegetation down along the entrance to town on Old Arcata Road, which helps make the community more welcoming to students starting their first semester of school, as well as parents leaving their children alone for the first time in a new community. Meanwhile, other OE3 members maintain the Arcata Community Forest, famous for its giant redwood trees, lush ferns and well-kept trail systems.

To handle their responsibilities, these members operate a variety of equipment that includes rideable mowers, weed-whackers, sod-cutters, aerators, hoppers, mini dump-trucks, boom-trucks, scissor-lifts and tractors.

"Some days are exhausting, like those when we are pruning trees and wood-chipping, but today I'm sitting on a mower, so I'll probably go home just fine," said Rusty.

Each day when he does go home, Rusty takes great pride in the work he and his fellow City workers have done for their community. He wears that pride on his hands, where he had the words "PARX CREW" tattooed across his knuckles upon completion of a two-year skills progression that saw him promoted to Senior Maintenance Worker.

"I had joked that I'd tattoo 'PARX CREW' in Viking runes across my knuckles after getting the title, and then I did it," he said with a chuckle. "Now I'm kind of the mascot."

"I love this job. It's a labor of love," he said, noting that his union membership is a big part of why that is the case. "I've always liked being a union guy. Every year, we negotiate something good. The protections are great. The benefits are great. And honestly, I don't know why someone wouldn't want to be in the union. It's been a great, great experience."

OE3 JATC draws crowd at World Ag Expo

The Operating Engineers Local 3 Journeyman and Apprentice Training Center (OE3 JATC) recently hosted a booth at the World's Ag Expo in Tulare, Calif. This is the world's largest ag expo, drawing thousands of people a day, who are looking for the latest and greatest in farming technology. At the OE3 JATC booth, expo attendees enjoyed using mini excavator simulators to perform a skills challenge and virtual simulators for practice on loaders, cranes, haul-trucks and more.

Booth attendees also had the opportunity to meet with OE3 JATC's staff, including myself, Lead Training Coordinator Cat Lytle, Senior Apprenticeship Coordinator Sabrina Martin, District 90 Apprenticeship Coordinator Dana Dauenhauer, Foreman Dwayne Plummer, District 50 Apprenticeship Coordinator Larry Thompson and District 20 Apprenticeship Coordinator Richie Dominguez.

According to Thompson, who oversees apprentices in the Central Valley (known for its farming), "I've always thought that there was a missing link between us [OE3 JATC] being able to get tied in with those farm kids that already have some experience on equipment, and with time and a lot of good training, they can progress in steps."

Of course, the Apprenticeship Program isn't just for young people or those with farming backgrounds, as applicants of all ages and backgrounds are encouraged to apply.

"We train people every day that that come to us really green," said Thompson. "They've never even seen some of the equipment that they're about to operate."

But for those who do see it, such as at an event like the World Ag Expo, people are interested in operating equipment no matter their age.

"We've had everything from the littlest guys of maybe five years old to probably some sixty-year-old men, giving it a shot," said Thompson. His advice for anyone who is applying to the Apprenticeship Program and wants to excel?

"Be willing to work hard, be available for your employer, and just be a good person. And that's what we need. We will take attitude over ability all day long."

Pedestrian safety improvements nearing start

Report
Members with **Asta Construction** continue to perform underground work for the expansion of Armijo High School. North of Dixon, tree removal is being performed by **Mountain F. Enterprises** for the Stevenson Bridge rehabilitation project. **A & B Construction** will have work this season. **Kiewit** and **Ghilotti Bros.** continue to keep members working through the winter in Fairfield on multiple projects.

Ghilotti Construction has been awarded a \$1.7 million contract for the Saint Helena Main Street Pedestrian Improvement project, which will begin this year. Once completed, the project will enhance pedestrian safety and accessibility along Main Street by removing and replacing the existing sidewalks that extend from Pine Street to Adams Street, parallel to Hwy. 29. This project will include the installation of approximately 9,000 square feet of concrete

flatwork demolition, 5,000 square feet of concrete paver demolition, 1,200 square feet of concrete curb demolition, 3,100 linear feet of asphalt removal, 10,000 square feet of concrete pedestrian sidewalk, 1,500 square feet of concrete ADA ramps, 2,000 square feet of concrete driveways, 2,100 linear feet of electrical conduit, six sanitary sewer laterals and the complete replacement of all trees within the project area. The project is expected to be completed in the fall of this year.

Steady work on multiple slide repairs

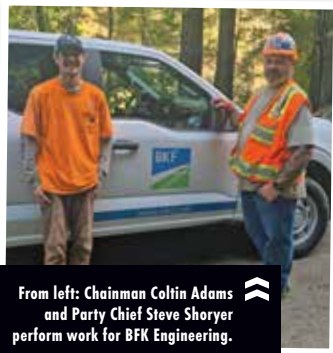
Report

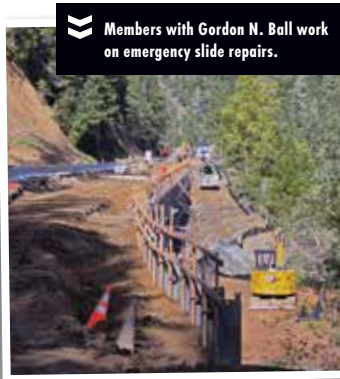

Busy spring ahead

Report
From Reno
As we move into the warmer months, the workload for OE3 members across Northern Nevada is shaping up to be one of the busiest in recent years. Contractors are reporting steady calls for operators, with several major infrastructure and mining projects leading the way. Members should expect a consistent demand for skilled hands as these projects ramp up through the summer season.

Granite Construction is taking the lead on the long-anticipated Sparks Boulevard Improvement Project, valued at over \$68.8 million. This extensive job includes roadway-widening, intersection upgrades and pedestrian safety enhancements, which will keep crews busy well into next year. Meanwhile, **Bechtel's** major work continues, providing stable hours for many operators across multiple phases of development.

Ames Construction is making big strides on the Golden Valley Project, a \$126.7 million effort that's a key part of Washoe County's growing infrastructure improvements. **Sierra Nevada Construction (SNC)** is also contributing to the busy season with its 4th Street Safety Project, a \$19.1 million upgrade focused on improving traffic flow and public safety in Reno's downtown corridor.

With the combination of infrastructure expansion and robust mining operations, 2026 is shaping up to be a strong year for our members and the communities we help build every day.

Apprentices at the Northern Nevada Operating Engineers Local 3 Joint Apprenticeship Training Center in Wadsworth aren't getting any "snow days" off this season, as they were out in the elements, practicing their craft last month. Remember to stay safe out there!

The work picture has faced ups and downs with this year's unseasonably warm weather. Fortunately, our signatory contractors have been awarded a few new projects in the area that will put members to work.

Acha Construction will return to the tribal school project in Owyhee after a short downtime during the winter. The new fire station in Battle Mountain remains on schedule. (Members worked through the cold winter weather to stay on track.) **Ames Construction** continues to keep members busy at the Meickle Mine in Carlin, as well as at the Granite Creek Project in Golconda. **N. A. Degerstrom** is in full swing at the Bald Mountain Mine site and has continued to work at the Rain Mine just outside of Carlin. The company has also continued to employ members at the Gold Bar Mine in Eureka.

We wish Paul a wonderful retirement enjoying his family and hobbies. We also thank him for his many years of service to our Local 3 members!



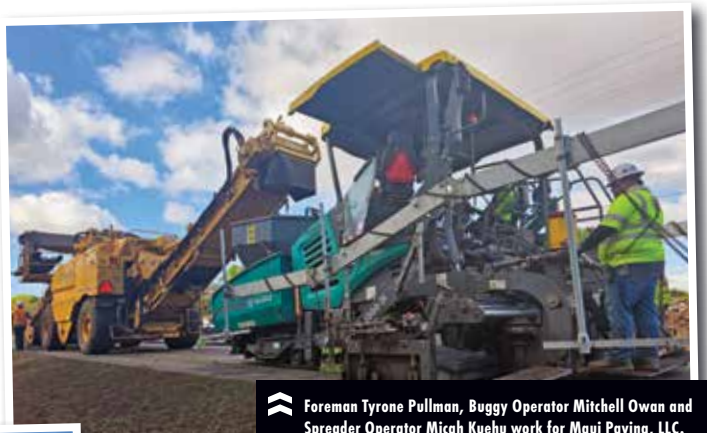

Highway improvement project for rural community

On the beautiful island of Molokai, **Maui Paving, LLC.** was awarded a \$12 million project to mill and pave Maunaloa Highway (Hwy. 460). The project started in early December 2025 and is projected to finish by the time this is printed. **Maui Paving** flies its crew in and out weekly to Molokai from Maui. All-union bridge project

The \$300 million Sacramento I Street Bridge Replacement Project is set to begin construction in Spring of this year and end in 2030. The project involves building a new 860-foot multimodal vertical lift bridge to improve regional connectivity and safety. Funding is primarily secured through \$250 million in federal Highway Bridge Program grants and \$25 million from the state's Local Partnership Program (SB 1), supported by a \$165 million local line of credit. Critically, the project is governed by a Community Workforce Training Agreement (CWTA), which requires all workers on the project to be union!

West Valley installing private utilities with new technology

Members with **West Valley** have been performing private utility upgrades using the latest technology available. The crew, led by Foreman **David Sanchez** (also a District 90 Political Action Committee (PAC) member), has found success through a system that is productive and safe. At the current jobsite in Cupertino, the crew has placed 900 linear feet with 10 communication boxes, all while promptly restoring the streets and sidewalks.

Member **Salvador Ortiz Garcia** explained, "This kind of scope has helped refine my skillset, as there are so many different opportunities on different machines."

Micro-trenching has shown to be effective when permitted in open areas, and utilities have been verified via potholing with hydro-excavation.

"It is a clean operation as the Vac-Truck hooks into the micro-trencher, and it will process over 100 feet an hour depending on soils," he said.

Foreman **David Sanchez** urges members to show up and be involved with politics, "We have a process interviewing our elected leaders and future leaders, from

school boards to governors, and vetting them to see if their interests will support our livelihoods, i.e. funding for jobs, Project Labor Agreements (PLAs), etc."

District 90's counties of Monterey, San Benito, Santa Clara and Santa Cruz will be involved in more than 200 races and ballot measures, with a magnitude of representatives to interview. Once we have determined who and what our union is supporting, we have several different ways of contributing. The biggest form comes from phone banking, hanging flyers and knocking on doors, along with monetary contributions, which are approved by the Executive Board. Volunteers can also earn Voice of the Engineer (VOTE) hours, which qualify them for gifts or gift cards, depending on how much time is contributed. These incentives are not limited to union members only; community and family members are eligible for the same benefits. For more information, call your local district office.

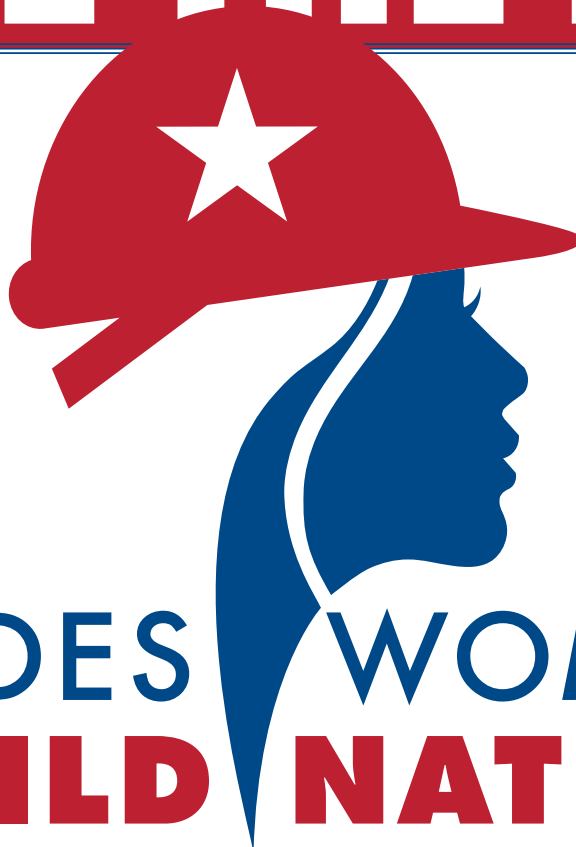

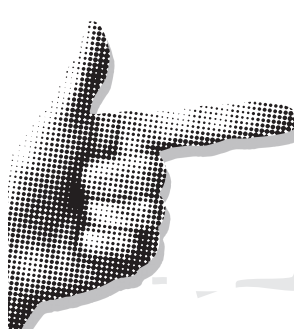

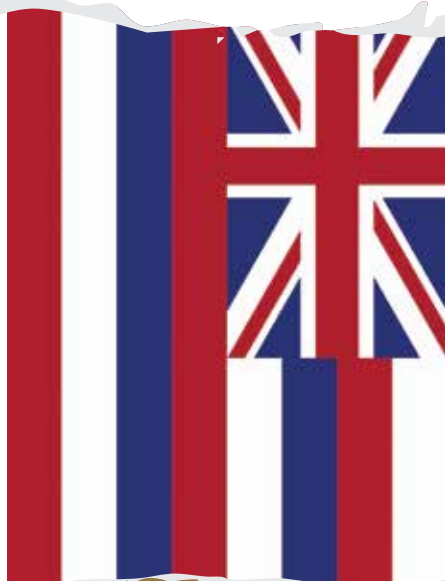
