The same needs since 1939

When is the last time you took a look at your OE3 Bylaws? If it's been a while, I'd like to share a refresher. From laying out guidelines for district meetings to the responsibilities of a Shop Steward, the Bylaws describe exactly how our union is run, and why it is set up the way it is. The why is what I want to focus on, and it starts on Page 1.

Article I lays out the objects and purposes of the union, which date back to when the first Local 3 Bylaws were written. These objects and purposes, or Core Values, were informed by the necessities that all the founding members could relate to. These principles, or the union's Shared Needs, still hold true for all of us as members today.

They are:

- * **Education and Training**
- * **Steady employment**
- * **Good wages**
- * **Strong benefits**
- * **Safe, responsible and professional working conditions**
- * **Dignified Retirement**
- * **Collective Bargaining Rights**



Like I mentioned, the Core Values were a framework that the founders built the union around, and the language of the Bylaws reflects that. A direct connection to the Bylaws can be found for every item listed at left, and each need is reflected multiple times.

In the case of a need for good wages and strong benefits, the Bylaws say, "The objects and purposes of this Local Union are to... secure and improve for its Members their wages, benefits, hours of labor and other conditions of employment."

Even though Local 3 was formed almost 90 years ago, the why of what we do is still the same. The objects and purposes of this local union have always been to provide for and protect the rights of its members, and that won't ever change. Everything this union does ensures these needs are met.

If you have questions about any section of the Bylaws, contact your district representative or business agents. They are happy to help explain and discuss with you. Otherwise, stay safe and keep up the good work as the warmer, drier season sets in.

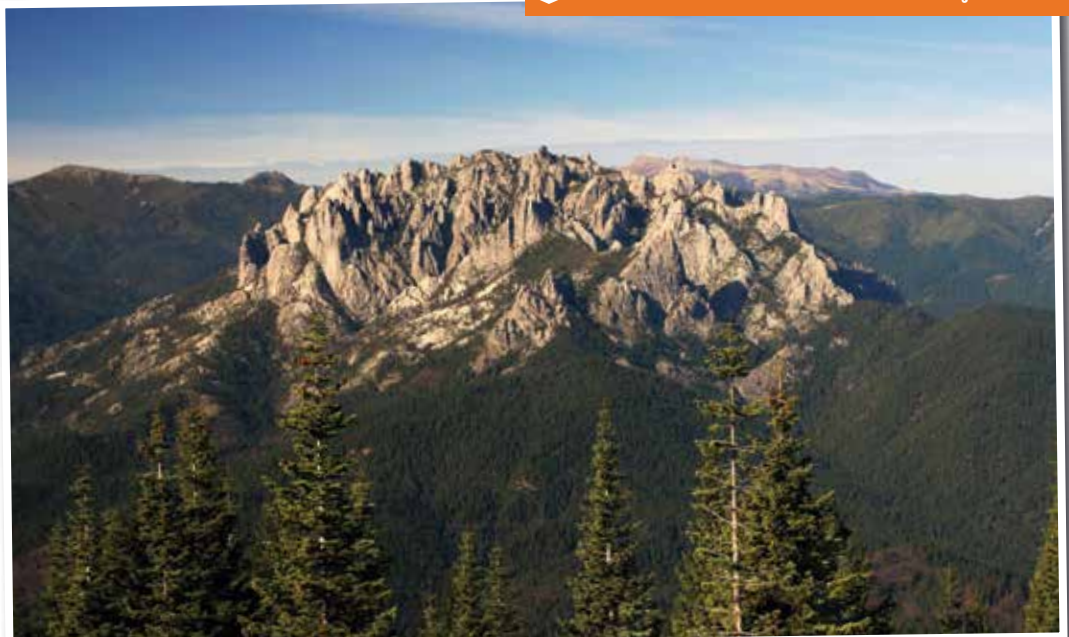

Proud to serve our membership

Three years ago, I retired from over 20 years as a 911 dispatcher and started my career with OE3. I was nervous, because 911 was what I had known for the last two decades, but I had been diagnosed with Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) and told I would not make it another five years if I continued. I loved my job, but it was eye-opening to see how deeply stress and anxiety had taken hold.

When your family is made up of military members and public safety workers, you are raised to serve others. I had spent the last 12 years serving as a shop steward, representing my fellow members in both negotiations and day-to-day issues. When the opportunity came to apply for a business agent position, I felt that those 12 years had prepared me to serve to the best of my abilities.

My time as a business agent has shown me how rewarding it can be to serve others in a different way.

Now, instead of a voice on the phone, I give them a voice when they feel they do not have one. I am the face that fights for the members, but I am not perfect. Some days, I feel frustrated when my hands are tied and there is nothing I can do. Some days, I wonder if I can keep doing this work.

Other days, a win (big or small), helps me realize that I am making a difference. Those are the days that keep me going. When we get a little more at the negotiation table, save someone's job or prove that an employer did not follow the rules and are able to fix it, we, as business agents, see that we are truly helping people.

Those wins help keep us fighting, but to be honest, what we need the most is YOU! Our strength is in those who are willing to stand up and fight for their rights and the rights of their fellow members. It can be hard to stand up when others are only willing to talk in the shadows and complain; it can feel like putting a spotlight on yourself. I am thankful for the members and stewards who have done exactly that. They did the right thing for themselves and others, even when it was hard.

If your employer changes your working conditions, violates the Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) or even if you aren't sure if what they did is grievable, reach out to your business agent. Don't be afraid to ask questions. If we can help, we will. That is why we are here!

Thank you all for being members, caring about what happens and fighting for your rights!

City of Newman OE3 Public Employees get agreement

After two rounds of negotiations, Local 3 members and the City of Newman finally came to an agreement. (This is an improvement from the last negotiations cycle, which took three rounds and brought the members up to industry standards. This means, we are improving!)

The current agreement includes:

- ▶ **A 9 percent pay increase**
- ▶ **Bilingual pay increase**
- ▶ **\$75 more per year in medical contributions paid by the City**
- ▶ **A new retirement contribution paid by the City, with no change in operational hours**
- ▶ **Access to OE3 medical and dental benefits**

As the work season ramps up, the Operating Engineers Local 3 Journeyman and Apprentice Training Center (OE3 JATC) continues to offer classroom and hands-on training to apprentices and journeymen alike, giving OE3 members all kinds of opportunities to expand their skills, become more valuable to current or potential employers and increase their chances for getting dispatches sooner, so they can start building up good work hours.

Over the next few months, multiple classes of new apprentices will be receiving their Probationary-Orientation Period (POP) training, while those with some work hours on the books will be returning for Supplemental-Related Training (SRT). A variety of journeyman-upgrade trainings will be offered to members who qualify, including National Commission for the Certification of Crane Operators (NCCCO) refresher courses in May, June, July and August. Mechanics organize at Green Waste Recovery

In August of 2024, Albert Tamayo had the opportunity to meet a couple mechanics working for Green Waste Recovery. Our organizers spent time talking to them about pay scales, working conditions and what it was like working in the shop. During that conversation, they mentioned that the garbage truck drivers were represented by OE3, but these mechanics had not been included in their original Collective Bargaining Agreement (CBA).

Management kept assuring them that they would be taken care of, but after 20 years of poor treatment, enough was enough. The mechanics decided it was time to take matters into their own hands and pursue a union contract.

After learning about the National Labor Relations Board (NLRB) verification process, all 13 mechanics in the shop came together to sign authorization cards. The unionization vote was successful, and bargaining began. A three-year deal was negotiated with the company, which included increases in wages and better benefits for the shop members. OE3 now represents over 80 drivers from Green Waste Recovery!

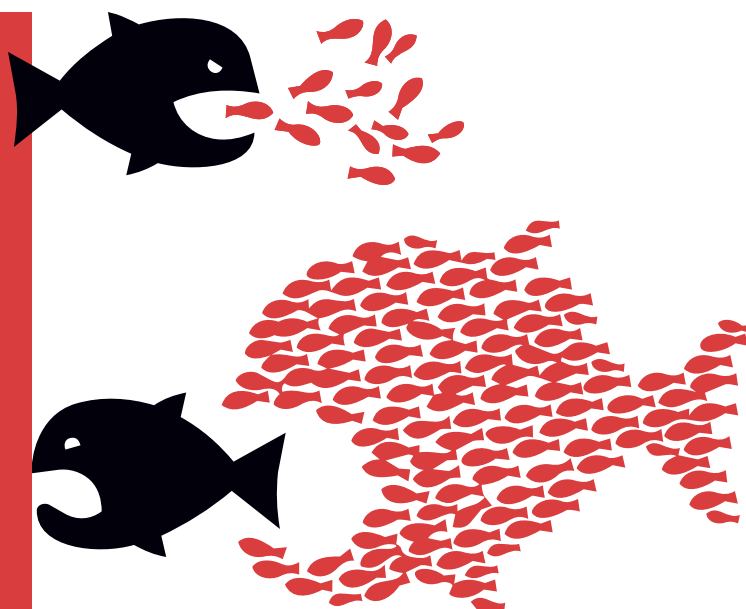

POIPU ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

Excavator Operator John Kanhai is part of the Goodfellow Bros., Inc. crew transforming one of the island's busiest travel corridors. The \$70 million Poipu Road improvements project is a sweeping safety overhaul that includes the addition of roundabouts, bike lanes and improved pedestrian crosswalks, all designed to slow traffic and protect residents and visitors.

"Right now, we are mass ex-ing and grading for sidewalks, and then we go ahead and do for the curbing," said Kanhai, who got his start as an Operating Engineer through the Apprenticeship Program more than 20 years ago. For him, the work carries a deeper meaning, "The best part is making a difference, and getting it done safely."

WAIMEA CANYON DRIVE PROJECT

Foreman Chad Pimentel has been leading a crew with Goodfellow Bros., Inc. on the Waimea Canyon Drive road-widening project, a pavement reconstruction and resurfacing effort along a heavily trafficked roadway that provides entry to Waimea Canyon State Park. Years of wear and tear from a steady stream of tourists has made the project essential to ensuring the integrity and safety of this economically important route to one of the most scenic parts of the Hawaiian Islands. "Grace Pacific did their paving," Pimentel explained. "We start from there, doing the road widening, and it goes seven miles up."

HOKUALA SUBDIVISION PROJECT

In Lihue, OE3 members with Earthworks Pacific are working on the Hokuala Subdivision project, where crews are currently performing the dirt work for housing that will be situated within a 450-acre oceanfront resort community. HANAPEPE HOMES PROJECT

In Hanapepe, Operator Foreman Kui Palama of Hawaiian Dredging is working on the infrastructure for the Hawaiian Homes project, a multi-phase development that has been employing Operating Engineers since 2023 and is expected to continue through 2027. Considered a priority by the County of Kauai, the project is delivering housing for local residents, a mission that is personal for Palama.

"We're building homes for our community!" he said with pride when asked what he was doing on the project. "Right now, we're just doing flatwork and some sidewalk work."

Palama, who joined OE3 in 2014, is also quick to point out the importance of this work being done by union hands.

"The union's a place to go if you want to start off a career," he said.

"It provides pretty much everything you need as far as starting off and raising a family."

UAHI RIDGE PROJECT

In Lihue, operator and island Steward Kanuni Viado is working for Goodfellow Bros., Inc. on the \$40 million Uahi Ridge project. This affordable housing development broke ground last year and will deliver 156 units of multi-family rental housing by project completion, which is scheduled for this December.

The project will serve families earning at or below 60 percent of the Area Median Income (AMI), a critical investment in a community where affordable housing is in short supply.

Beyond operating equipment, Viado has spent years committing his free time to his union, as a member of Kauai's Political Action Committee (PAC). In that role, he works with other rank-and-file OE3 members and staff, interviewing local candidates to determine who will stand for the issues and concerns that unite Operating Engineers and other working people. With this being an election year, he expects to be busy in that role for the foreseeable future.

"We interview the candidates that are running for council or mayor, to try and get to know them and see what they're offering, to help us in the construction business, as far as jobs ..." he said, noting that part of that responsibility is letting individuals running for elected office know how important Operating Engineers Local 3 is to local residents.

"This is one of the best unions, I think, that's out there right now," he said. "Our medical is unreal, and the Pension and Annuity just can't be beat."

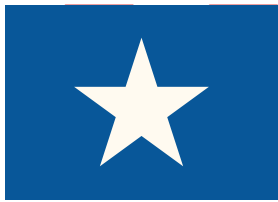

Paving and utility projects underway

Report
In San Francisco, **Esquivel Grading and Paving** is at Winston Drive near Stonestown working under the city-wide Project Labor Agreement (PLA), upgrading ADA ramps and improving pavement. The \$9 million contract will continue through the end of the year. Foreman and Paver Operator **Kelvin Snell** and roller backhoe operators **Hector Nunez** and **Ernesto Lorenzo** are working on the project.

On Evans Street, Excavator Operator **Willie Watters** with **Corcus Construction** is replacing existing concrete sidewalk and utility vaults.

In North Beach, **Hernandez Engineering** is replacing a sewer line and patch-paving for the San Francisco Public Utilities Commission (SFPUC). Excavator Operator **Diego Calvillo** is onsite.

At the City College of San Francisco (CCSF) housing project on Frida Kahlo Way, **Preston Piplines** is installing a 72-inch storm drain. Foreman **Jesús Contreras** is overseeing the work, with Excavator Operator **Ryan Dale** and Loader Operator **David Birlem**.

In San Mateo County, **Pacific Coast Drilling Company (PCDC)** drilled a 60-inch-diameter, 75-foot-deep hole to install a new digital sign for Hwy. 101. The sign will alert drivers of traffic conditions, accidents and other important notices. **Jason M. Schuster** is foreman, Apprentice **Wyatt Adams** is oiling, **Ken L. Rose** is running a CZM-300 drill and **Dan Ballou** is on the concrete pump.

In San Bruno, at 901 Cherry Ave., the YouTube headquarters is getting renovated. **SafwayAtlantic** is onsite with dual outside hoists. **Allison Samaro** and **Kevin J. Castain** are hard at work.

Infrastructure work continues; new school arena underway

Report
Unseasonably warm weather has kept projects moving in the district. On Hwy. 12 in Solano County, **Bay Cities Paving & Grading** has taken advantage of the warm nights to continue working. New projects starting this season include infrastructure work by members with **Koios Engineering** and **Mountain Cascade**, on multiple new city wells in Vacaville. In Fairfield, **Ghilotti Construction Company (GCC)** will start the Midtown Sewer Replacement soon. The work picture in Solano is also looking strong for the season.

GCC was awarded the \$3.6 million Benicia High School Field Upgrades Project and is currently grading a 217,000 square-foot-field-area, hauling in around 8,600 tons of Class 2 Aggregate Base (AB). **GCC** is also installing roughly 3,000 linear feet of varying sized storm

drains, which will include hauling in over 3,000 tons of three-quarter-inch drain rock. Roughly 33,000 square feet of sidewalk and 2,500 square feet of four-foot-tall retaining wall will also be installed. This project started earlier this year and is expected to be completed by December. When finished, the school will have a newly-transformed, state-of-the-art baseball and softball facility with new artificial turf, upgraded lights, new dugout seating, a concession stand, restrooms and more.

Argonaut Constructors has been busy with several projects and was the low bidder on the Amarosa Academy Site Development Project at \$2.2 million. The company has also picked up the Calistoga Road Pavement Rehabilitation and Utility Improvement Project for \$10.5 million, which will go from Montecito Boulevard to Hwy. 12.

Ghilotti Bros. is performing emergency slide repair on Hwy. 116 near Guerneville with subcontractors Pacific Coast Drilling Company (PCDC), Precision Crane and Castle Concrete Pumping. Excavator Operator Jonathan Reymundo with Ghilotti Bros., Jerry Breeden with Precision Crane and Travis Jones, Ulises Duran and Gerardo Guzman with PCDC are at the site.

Work continues on the Graton Casino Expansion Project. This project is being done under a local Project Labor Agreement (PLA), which means that all work on the project will utilize union labor. While most of the underground and dirt work is complete for the hotel expansion, there is still more work to be done for the amphitheater. Members with Maxim Crane are onsite operating tower cranes.

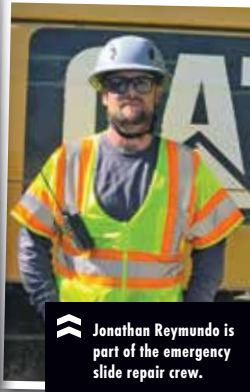

Crew highlight: Geneva Rock Products Layton Yard

Report
Sitting next to Hill Air Force Base, the **Geneva Rock Products Layton Yard** has served as a hub of productivity, skill and union pride in Northern Utah since 1990. The site was designated as the primary yard for the region until 2022, when **Geneva Rock Products** added a new shop in Ogden, and continues to play a critical role in supporting infrastructure for the region.

Two batch plants and a reclaimer are operated at the yard, servicing a fleet of 22 trucks. In a strong production year, the team averages an impressive 200,000 yards of batch concrete, made possible by the dedication and expertise of both the mechanic shop and plant operators.

At the heart of the yard is the Heavy-Duty Repair (HDR) mechanic shop crew, responsible for maintaining and repairing the equipment that keep operations running smoothly. Leading the group are Foreman **Josh Brimhall** and Job Steward **Devan Rees**, and rounding out the team are **Cliston Ivey, Juvenal Carreno, Nate Romer** and **Keith Whited**. Supporting production on the plant side are batch operators **David Roybal, Jeff Elias** and **Michael Wenerstrom**. Together, they ensure consistent, high-quality output, while maintaining the efficiency and safety standards that define union craftsmanship.

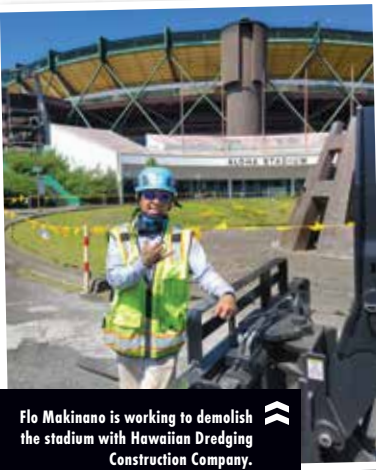
Title
Stadium, entertainment district create years of work

Report
Demolition work began this past February on Aloha Stadium to make way for a new stadium project. Aloha Stadium was the largest multi-purpose stadium in the State of Hawaii, sitting on 98 acres of land. The facility served the community for approximately 50 years, from 1975 until its closure in December 2020, which was due to structural issues. Demolition is expected to continue through 2026.

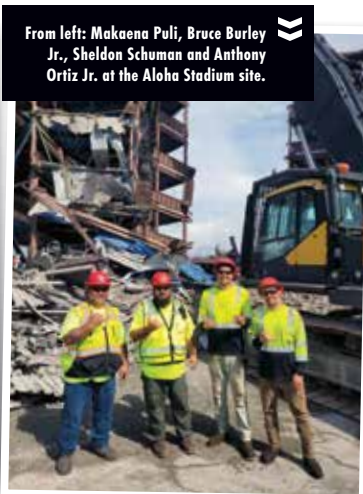
Companies involved with the project include General Contractor **Hawaiian Dredging Construction Company** (contract worth \$20 million), **Northwest Demolition and Dismantling** (performing the majority of the demolition for \$14.5 million) and **Island Steel Erectors, LLC** (providing crane assistance for \$4 million).

The new stadium is projected to open in March 2029 with a seating capacity of 25,000 to 35,000. It will serve as the anchor for a larger entertainment district that will feature housing, retail, hotels and entertainment spaces. While the stadium itself is estimated at \$500 million, the overall project cost could exceed \$1 billion.

This development will create years of work for our members and highlight the essential role of Skilled and Trained operators from Local 3.

Variety of jobsites makes steady work

Report
Public works projects continue to keep OE3 members busy throughout the area. In Hayward, **Duran and Venables, Inc.** and **Griffin Soil** are working on the Lorenzo Manor Elementary School project. The elementary school is undergoing significant long-term modernization and new classrooms funded by district bonds.

Griffin Soil is also working at the Stack Data Center alongside **Joseph J. Albanese, Inc.** and **Malcom Drilling**. Demolition at the site has been completed and soil stabilization is now underway. Key site improvements include new driveways at Eden Landing Road and Production Avenue, internal road circulation, parking, a loading dock, stormwater management systems, landscaping, utilities, a water tank and a perimeter security fence.

Chabot College is currently undertaking a major renovation of its Gladiator Stadium. The project brings together multiple contractors to modernize the stadium and improve safety across the facility. **Robert A. Bothman Construction** is serving as the general contractor, working alongside subcontractors **Bockman and Woody Electric Company, Inc.** and **Cozart Brothers**.

Located in the Decoto neighborhood of Union City, **D-Line Constructors, Inc.** and **Howard Earth Boring Service** are currently working on the Lazuli Landing project at Mission and E Street. This development will create an 81-unit, 100 percent affordable housing community. The project also includes integrated community features, such as ground-floor commercial space designed to support local businesses and neighborhood needs.

Suarez and Munoz Construction, Inc., in partnership with the Hayward Area Recreation and Park District (HARD), is developing Ashland Grove Park in San Leandro. The project involves transforming approximately 1.5 acres of land in the unincorporated Ashland community. Construction is expected to take about 12 months, with certain components scheduled for completion as late as Fall 2027, depending on the project phase. Work includes site preparation, grading, drainage improvements and the installation of new park facilities.

There are many other projects underway throughout Alameda and Contra Costa Counties. As the work season ramps up, we would like to wish everyone a safe and prosperous working season.

The \$56 million College of the Redwoods Physical Education Building Replacement Project, under General Contractor **Broward Builders, Inc.**, has been moving forward rapidly for the last year. Initial site work is complete, and the steel-framed gymnasium is going up. **Malcolm Drilling** has nearly completed the wall behind the turf field, with only tie-backs remaining, and sub-grade work is starting for the future field house. Kirby Canyon Landfill has been keeping members busy since their first dispatches in 2001. This landfill is home to 10 members who run and maintain it all year. There are no rain days, seasonal breaks or downtime for this unit, as the facility is open Monday through Saturday.

Unlike most construction dispatches, where workers may move from one job to another and work with different crews, this unit stays together full-time, which has helped them develop close relationships with one another. These relationships are apparent when you watch the day-to-day operations and management at the landfill.

Across the district, work is picking up. **Skanska** is “full-steam ahead” for the Amazon Data Center in Gilroy, a 56-acre site covered under a Project Labor Agreement (PLA), meaning all heavy equipment work will be done by our brothers and sisters.

Great Oaks is beginning the last of three data centers in south San Jose, which is under another PLA that has provided work for our signatories and members. With work picking up, be sure to call the Hall and make sure your information is up-to-date for the Out-of-Work List, including any new certifications or qualifications you may have gotten during the winter. 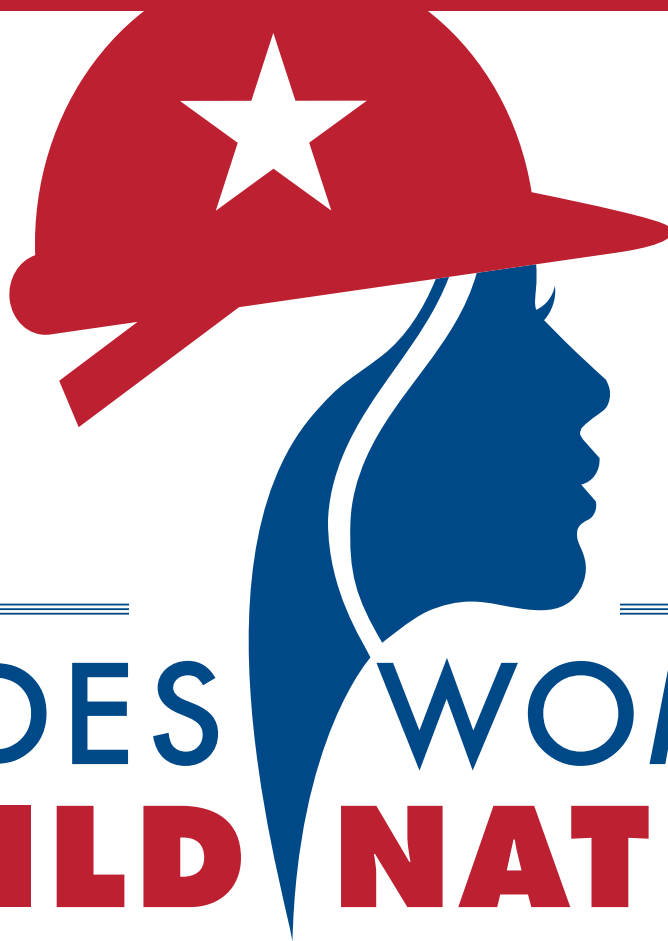

The Strength Behind Local 3

If you have been part of Local 3 for any length of time, you already know this is not just a job. It is a way of life, and it is not always easy.

The work is demanding. The hours are long. Life outside of work doesn't always pause just because the job needs to get done. Like anyone else, our members face real-life challenges, stress, pressure and family responsibilities. At times, everything hits at once and feels heavier than expected.

What I have seen over and over again is: **Local 3 members do not just push through adversity. They carry each other through it.**

When things are good, you see it. There is pride in the work, pride in the union and a shared understanding of what it means to be part of something bigger than yourself. When things are not good, you see it even more. People check in. They step up. They don't let each other disappear. There is a level of accountability and care that is hard to put into words, but it shows up when it matters most.

That kind of brotherhood and sisterhood is real. I did not fully understand how strong it was until I saw it up close. In the work we do through the Assistance and Recovery Program (ARP), we meet members during some of the hardest times in their lives (situations that are not always visible on the surface). What has stood out to me is how often the support around them is already there, whether it is a co-worker who notices something is off, a conversation that happens at the right time or a willingness to speak up when it counts.

This union shows up for its members, and not just in the obvious ways but in the quieter ones, in the conversations, in the advocacy and in the decisions being made with the well-being of members and their families in mind. I have watched the union lean in when it matters. I have seen the effort to make sure members are not left to figure things out on their own. No one is perfect. No life is without challenges; however, tough situations are better handled when support is available. That support makes a difference.

Support also strengthens the work we do. ARP does not operate on its own. It works because of the trust and the shared goals between the union and the membership. Everyone is working toward the same outcome. Members want to stay steady, take care of their families and keep moving forward. The union wants the same thing.

The truth is the road can get long. There are times when things build up, when stress, pressure or habits start to take a toll. It is not always obvious when you have crossed from handling it into something that is harder to manage. That does not make anyone weak. It makes you human.

What matters is what happens next.

I have seen members make the decision to reach out and take support when it is offered. I have seen what can come from that. Stability. Clarity. Repaired relationships. Getting back to a place where things feel manageable again. It takes effort. It takes honesty. It does not happen overnight. It is worth it.

Every time I see the way this union shows up, how members support each other, how the organization advocates and how everyone comes together when it counts, it fuels me to continue the work and stay in the fight alongside you. There is something solid here, something people can lean on when things get unsteady. That matters more than people realize.

If you ever find yourself in a place where things feel off or heavier than they should, you do not have to carry it by yourself. There is support here for you. You can reach out to ARP at any time. We will talk with you about what is going on and help you take the next step, whatever that looks like.

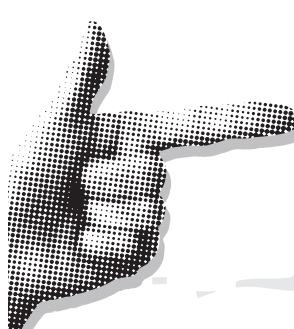

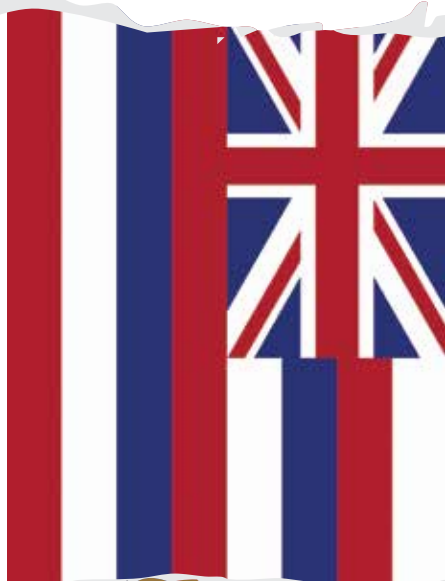
