Caltrans members ensure driver safety

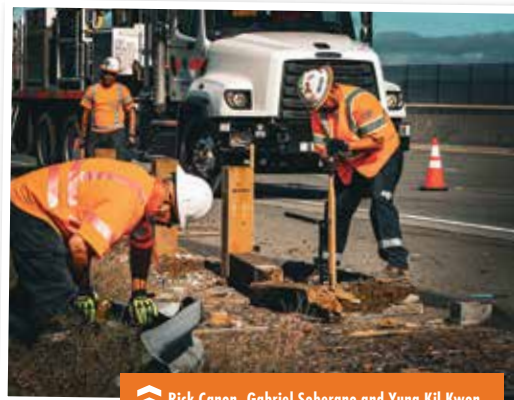
On California Hwy. 4, long after emergency crews have left an accident scene and traffic starts moving again, another crew shows up to do work most people never see. The Caltrans Fence and Guardrail crew steps in to repair what was damaged, restore safety and make sure drivers who pass through are protected.

This work deserves more recognition than it gets. These men and women are out there in all conditions — heat, cold, traffic flying by at highway speeds — doing physically demanding labor with precision and focus.

They're not just fixing metal; they're rebuilding a critical safety system.

After an accident, guardrails may be twisted, posts may be shattered and debris is scattered along the shoulder. The crew starts by clearing out damaged material, digging out broken posts and hauling away debris. It's not easy work. They're dealing with compacted soil, splintered wood and bent steel. Every damaged piece is removed safely before anything new goes in.

Then, the rebuilding starts. New posts are driven into the ground (sometimes by hand tools, sometimes with equipment), and each

one is set to the proper depth and alignment. This is an important step, because a guardrail only works if it's installed exactly right. Then, the rail itself is mounted, bolted and tensioned. It has to be able to absorb impact and redirect a vehicle, and there's no room for shortcuts.

Even with cones and warning signs, it takes constant awareness and teamwork to stay safe, since these repairs are occurring just feet away from moving traffic. Everyone is watching out for each other, communicating and staying focused on the job. Safety isn't

just a policy out there, it's how they get through the day.

From a union perspective, this is exactly the kind of skilled, essential work we fight to protect. These crews are trained, experienced and take pride in what they do. They understand that what they're building could save someone's life tomorrow.

It's easy to overlook guardrails when you're driving down the highway. They're just part of the background — until you need them. The same goes for the crews who install and repair them. But after seeing the work up close, it's clear: their effort, skill and commitment keep California's roads safe.

First Quarter 2026 Consolidated Financial Results

The U. S. economy grew at a 2 percent pace in the first quarter of 2026, which is better than the 0.5 percent growth in the fourth quarter of 2025. The increase in Gross Domestic Product (GDP) can be attributed to private fixed investments, exports, consumer spending and government spending to make up for the 43 days of government shutdown in the fourth quarter of 2025.

The U. S. stock market took a hit, down by approximately 4 percent in the first quarter of 2026, mostly due to rising gas prices and the geopolitical tension caused by the turmoil in the Middle East. Considering the volatility of gas prices and the 3.3 percent increase of the Consumer Price Index (CPI), the Federal Reserve held interest rates steady at 3.5 to 3.75 percent in the first quarter of 2026.

The job market moved close to the territory of the “no-fire, no-hire” equilibrium. Employees stayed put to see what the Trump Administration would announce each day. The economy added 216,000 jobs in the first quarter of 2026. Employment in construction showed little net change over the prior 12 months.

Across Local 3’s jurisdictions, February 2026 Year-to-Date (YTD) Pension hours were 6 percent higher than in the same period in 2025.

Regarding the union’s finances, cash receipts and expenditure for the first quarter of 2026 were \$19.1 million and \$17.4 million, respectively. Total receipts for this quarter were \$1 million higher than in the same quarter in 2025. This is mostly due to higher dues rates (as a result of wage increases) and more work hours (6 percent increases). The expenditure for the first quarter of 2026 was \$1.3 million lower than in the first quarter of 2025. The decrease was primarily due to the transfer of funds to the Building Holding Association for a property purchase in the first quarter of 2025.

Despite the political turmoil in the Middle East and on U. S. soil, Local 3 is growing at a slow but steady rate. Membership numbers increased from 40,487 in December 2025 to 40,630 in March 2026 during what are typically the slowest months of the year. We will continue to utilize Local 3’s assets and resources to promote the union’s Core Values: Education and Training, Steady Employment, Good Wages, Strong Benefits, Safe, Responsible and Professional Working Conditions, a Dignified Retirement and Collective Bargaining Rights.

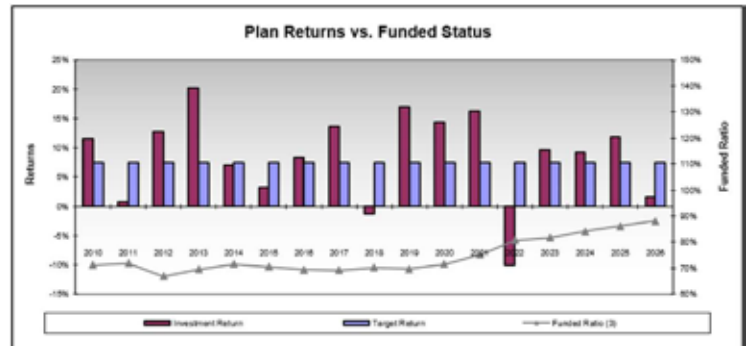
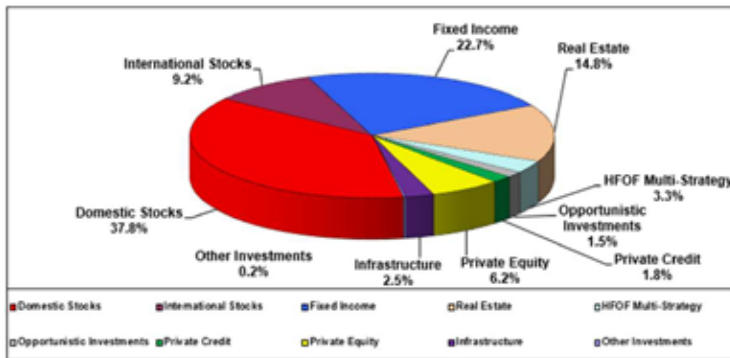

Commentary 1st Quarter 2026 - The U.S. economy entered 2026 on relatively solid footing despite a slowdown in late 2025. GDP growth moderated to 0.5% in Q4, largely due to the government shutdown, but underlying conditions remained supportive. Consumer demand held steady, financial conditions improved, and investment tied to artificial intelligence and infrastructure continued to provide a structural tailwind. Headline inflation increased in March, driven by a surge in energy prices following the escalating conflict in the Middle East and disruptions to global oil supply. The Federal Reserve maintained a cautious, data-dependent stance, holding rates steady after cuts in late 2025. While policymakers still anticipate eventual easing, rising energy prices and inflation concerns have pushed market expectations for rate cuts further into the future. Unemployment edged down to 4.3% and job openings declined. Equity markets faced a challenging start to the year, with the S&P 500 declining 4.4% in Q1. Early weakness stemmed from concerns that advances in artificial intelligence could disrupt traditional software business models, while a sharp rise in oil prices later in the quarter further pressured markets by reducing expectations for near-term Fed easing. Large-cap growth stocks (-9.8%) were hit hardest, while large value stocks posted gains (+2.1%). Sector performance diverged meaningfully as energy surged on higher oil prices and utilities and materials also advanced. In contrast, technology, financials, and consumer discretionary sectors declined. Despite the pullback, corporate earnings remained resilient, and valuations moderated from elevated levels. International equities declined modestly, with Europe particularly impacted by higher energy costs. Emerging market performance was mixed, supported in part by continued demand for AI-related semiconductors. A stronger U.S. dollar created an additional headwind for non-U.S. assets. Fixed income markets faced pressure as Treasury yields rose, particularly in intermediate maturities, reflecting higher inflation expectations and a repricing of monetary policy. Higher-quality and shorter-duration bonds generally outperformed, while longer-duration and lower-quality segments lagged. Overall, the first quarter reflected a shift in market leadership and rising macro uncertainty, though economic and corporate fundamentals remain broadly intact.

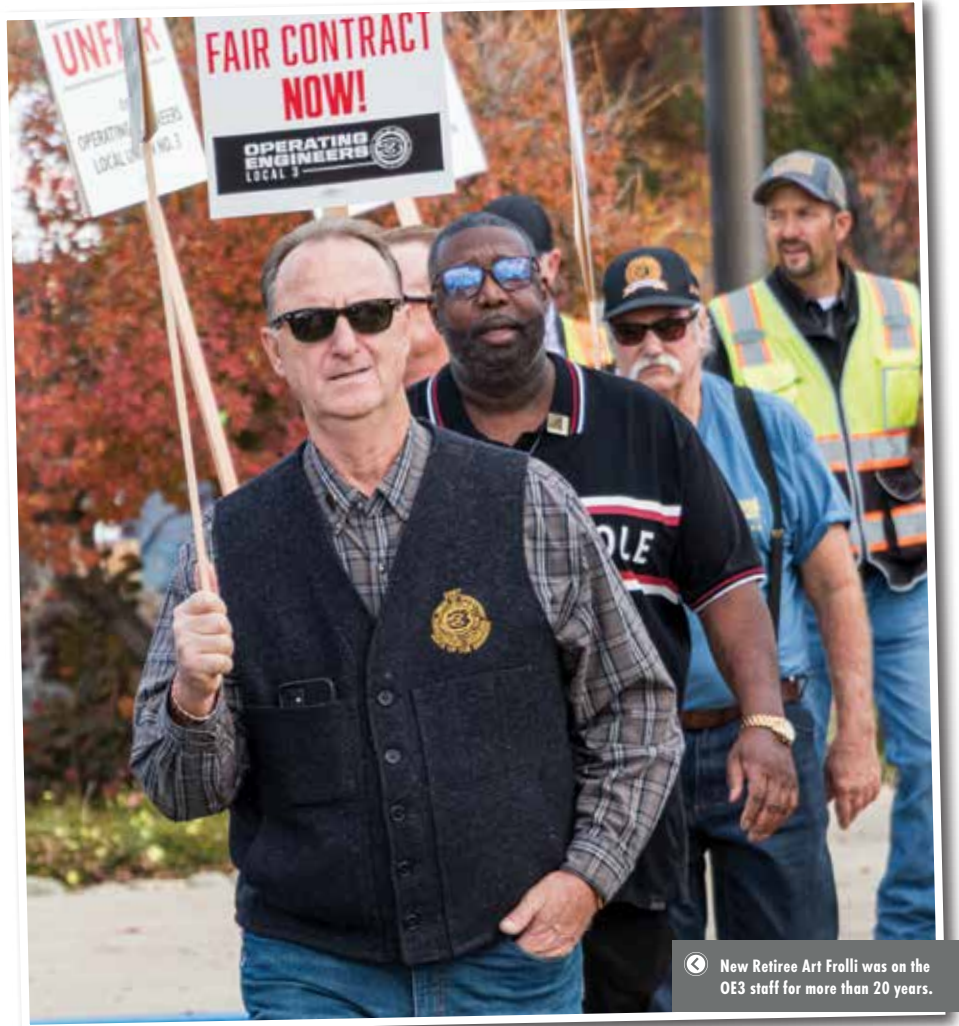
Happy retirement to longtime PE agent

CEMA/OE3 supports sweeping AI workplace bills

County Employees' Management Association (CEMA)/OE3 joined the California Federation of Labor along with other labor unions across the state in mounting a coordinated push behind a package of legislation aimed at regulating Artificial Intelligence (AI) and surveillance in the workplace. New guardrails are urgently needed, as technology reshapes jobs at an unprecedented pace. Below are the bills that CEMA/OE3 is particularly interested in supporting:

SB 951: AI Job Killer Notice

SB 951 would require employers to provide at least 90 days' notice for layoffs tied to AI or technological displacement. CEMA/OE3 supports the bill, because it addresses one of our primary concerns: sudden job loss without warning. The measure would also require employers to notify state agencies, helping track how AI is affecting employment across industries. The passage of SB 951 gives workers time to retrain or find new jobs, while also allowing communities to prepare for economic disruption.

SB 947: No Robot Bosses Act

SB 947 focuses on how AI is used in day-to-day workplace decisions. The bill would restrict employers from relying solely on automated systems to discipline or terminate workers and would require human oversight. AI decision-making can be opaque, error-prone and biased, so SB 947 counteracts that by providing accountability and ensuring that machines do not make life-altering decisions without human review.

AB 1883 and AB 1331: Cracking Down on Workplace Surveillance

AB 1883 would regulate employer use of surveillance tools and require greater transparency around monitoring technologies. Many workers are unaware of the extent to which they are tracked on the job, raising concerns about privacy and psychological stress.

AB 1331 places limits on where surveillance can occur and allows workers to disable monitoring tools in sensitive areas, such as bathrooms and other private spaces. CEMA/OE3 believes these measures respond to increasing reports of intrusive monitoring, including biometric tracking and constant digital oversight.

As AI is introduced into the workplace, CEMA/OE3 and many other labor unions believe there must be safeguards and balance, which can be done through legislation. These bills do not ban new technologies, but instead require transparency, human oversight and basic worker protections. CEMA/OE3 will continue to monitor and advocate for legislation that makes sure the future of work continues to prioritize working families, not robots.

First-round of POP students begin the 2026 season

In early May, the Operating Engineers Local 3 Journeyman and Apprentice Training Center (OE3 JATC) hosted our first 2026 Probationary Orientation Period (POP) apprentices. These apprentices stay at the training center site across a six-week period, after they have been accepted into the Apprenticeship Program. Many of them have had experience in the field, whether as a Laborer or part of another craft, but many come into the program with no experience and begin learning the craft in the classroom and on the equipment during this initial training. They will return to the training center again for more upgrades and will now begin getting more hours in the field.

Each POP class is different, and this one, for example, took great pride in gathering with fellow students from across the California districts. Retirement – when and how much?

Members near retirement regularly ask the Trust Funds staff, “When can I retire and how much will I get?”

You can call either (800) 251-5014 or (707) 290-1834, and we can go over your numbers and personal situation in detail. We will provide various options available, regarding when you can or should retire.

For example: If Joe Engineer is age 62 and has 20 Pension credits, he may retire with an early retirement at 73 percent of his current Pension amount, or he can continue working, and in 1.5 years, retire with a full “Rule-of-85” Service Pension. If he is disabled, we can discuss his options regarding Social Security disability and how that relates to his Pension. Remember, every Local 3 member will retire under the “when,” with one of these Pension types:

- ▶ **Normal**
- ▶ **Early**
- ▶ **Disability**
- ▶ **Service**
 - Rule of 85
 - 35/20
 - 59/30



Regarding Joe Engineer’s “how much?” we will also provide the exact current Pension and annuity amount, future projections, bonus Pension – otherwise known as the Delayed Retirement Incentive (DRI) amount, if applicable – and any reduced or enhanced Pension options.

For example, if Joe is eligible for a full Rule-of-85 Service Pension and wishes to work another year, we can project his “Bonus Pension” amount. If Joe is not 65 and has 10 or more Pension credits but is not eligible for a Service Pension, we can research the exact amount he would get under an early retirement.

Every Local 3 member will choose some combination of these payment options at retirement and this may never be changed.

- ▶ **Single Life Pension**
- ▶ **Life Pension with 60 months guaranteed**
- ▶ **Life Pension with 120 months guaranteed**
 - ▶ **Husband and Wife**
 - 50 percent
 - 75 percent
 - 100 percent

In western Fresno County, Calif., members of Operating Engineers Local 3 are working on the Darden Clean Energy Project, which is currently the largest solar energy project in the world. This massive project spans 9,500 acres and will be providing good work hours for a variety of Operating Engineers over the next two-and-a-half years.

M. A. Mortenson is the signatory contractor in charge of the project, which will be the site of approximately 3.1 million solar panels upon completion. Once operational, this solar farm will provide 1,150 megawatts (MW) of solar capacity and include 4,600 megawatt-hours (MWh) of battery storage for one of the nation's most economically and agriculturally important regions. It will also mark a significant milestone in California's efforts to increase energy production using renewable resources. Since crews broke ground in January, the project has become a major source of union employment in the Central Valley, particularly for Operating Engineers.

"We've had 137 dispatches of Operating Engineers, 20 of them being apprentices," said Clovis District 50 Business Agent Joe Giles, who noted that those numbers were as of early May and would be going up. "For members in our district, this job is very important."

Giles also said there are several members nearing the end of their careers, and appreciate the project, which is allowing them to work close to home on a long-term project that will carry them into their retirement.

The increased number of dispatches are producing a ripple effect that benefits all Operating Engineers by boosting work hours and contributions to their Pension and Health and Welfare Funds over the next few years.

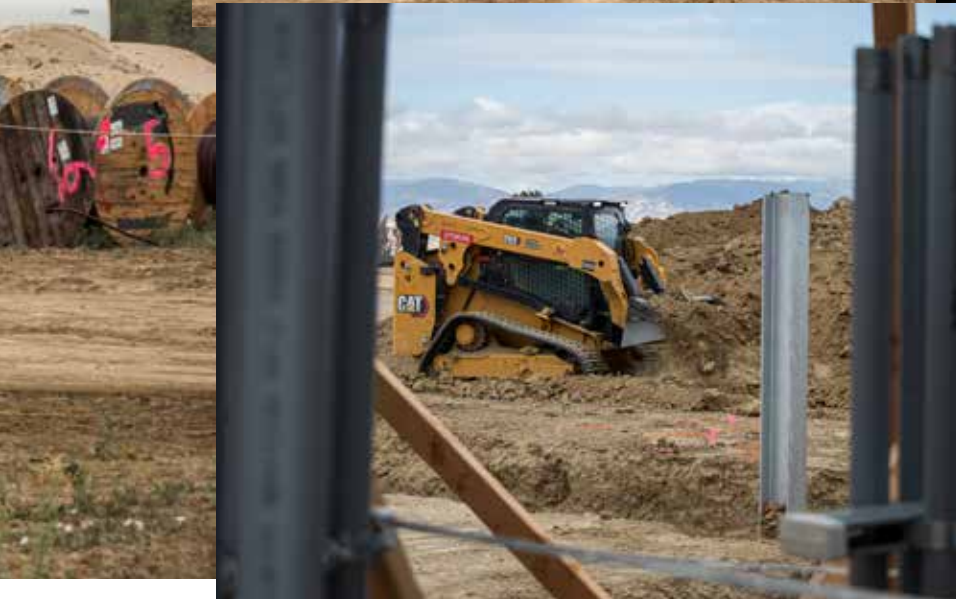

“The apprentices, they’re getting valuable experience out here,” added Giles, as OE3 works to meet the needs of the local workforce by providing valuable education and training through its Apprenticeship Program. “They could be out here for a couple of years running anything from dozer, excavator, scraper, blade, the post-pounders and gradesetting. It’s wide open, so it’s a perfect place to learn.”

Among those apprentices building up their skills and experience is Jose Montalvo, a resident of the nearby community of Kerman, who has been performing underground work for the electrical infrastructure onsite. Montalvo, a fifth-step apprentice, credits the union and the project with keeping him close to home and providing him with financial stability and reliable healthcare.

“It changed my life, ever since I became an operator,” Montalvo said. “We have really good wages, and the medical [benefits] are big for me... I had a few health issues, but now I’m able to take care of everything... The union, you know, they really take care of you.”

Gradesetter Arthur Ransom came to work on the Darden Clean Energy Project after previously working on a nearby section of California’s High-Speed Rail (HSR) project, and takes great pride in the labor he and his fellow union members provide on this and so many other projects.

“As a kid, I just wanted to wear lime green, an orange vest and a hard hat,” he said. “To drive past projects that you’ve completed, there’s no better feeling!”

Bernal Heights stays busy

In Foster City, Foreman **David Turner** and operators **Joshua D. G. Smith, Juan M. De La Campa, Frank Sanchez** and **Benjamin J. Williams** are demolishing six buildings on Chess Drive with **Silverado, Inc.** Also on Chess Drive, **Ransome Company** is doing one of many street repairs throughout the city, with Foreman **Alfredo Pena**.

In San Francisco's Bernal Heights, **Pacific States** is performing a mass excavation at the Mission Bernal Care Complex on Cesar Chavez and Valencia Streets. Operator **Henry Guzman** has been a key part of the load-out. **Malcolm Drilling** is onsite, shoring and drilling tiebacks. At the other end of Cesar Chavez Street, **Anvil Builders** is upgrading San Francisco Public Utilities Commission's (SFPUC's) water infrastructure under Foreman **Joshua Boyle**. Shoring and jet grouting on the deep excavations are being performed by **Malcolm**

Drilling, with Drill Operator **Chris Wood**. Batch Plant Operator **John Powell** is responsible for maintaining consistent ground stabilization material. Other onsite operators include **Dana Griffin, Krystal Lockett** and **Tyson Roberts**. Also in Bernal Heights, **Ronan Construction** is installing new ADA ramps and grinding and paving at Norwich and Alabama Streets, with Operator **Rigoberto Gonzalez** and Foreman **Rick Cisneros**.

Across town, **Michael O'Shaughnessy Construction** is installing 27-inch clay sewer pipe at Filbert and Pierce Streets in the Marina, with operators **Julio Alfaro** and **David Moran**.

Keeping highways safe

Report
Granite Rock Construction will have a crew working all summer at Lake Solano in the north end of Solano County. Crews will replace all the septic systems and multiple walking paths throughout the camp and picnic areas. The Lagoon Valley Development in Vacaville continues to grow, keeping members working for **J & M, Inc.** and **Independent Construction**. **Ghilotti Construction** is working on a residential development at Vanden Cove in Vacaville and will also be replacing the old section of Vanden Road, adjacent to the project.

Near Fairfield, work continues on the Cordelia Truck Scales Improvement Project with main contractor **Kiewit** and **Bragg Crane** assisting. Work involves replacing the existing westbound I-80 Cordelia Commercial Vehicle Enforcement Facility (CCVEF) with a new one that will provide a new off-ramp connection and new entrance ramp connection to/from westbound I-80. The new facility will have the capacity to inspect all westbound I-80 trucks passing the facility 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Vallejo has been in dire need of road repairs for a long time. Thanks to Operating Engineers, improvements are being made. On Hwy. 29, from Vallejo to the Napa County line, **Bay Cities Paving and Grading, Inc.** is the main contractor on this \$27 million Caltrans infrastructure project that will provide critical roadway enhancements. Work includes the installation of 15,000 tons of Type A and 36,000 tons of Rubberized Hot-Mix Asphalt (R-HMA) pavement, drainage improvements (including adjusting inlets) and the installation of new signals, sidewalks and curb ramps. Landscape restoration is also part of the overall site completion.

This investment directly translates into a safer, more reliable travel experience for the residents and visitors of Solano County: Rehabilitating the roadway surface reduces vehicle wear and tear, and the inclusion of new signals and ADA-compliant curb ramps significantly boosts pedestrian safety and accessibility. Improved, modernized drainage systems and landscape restoration will mitigate flooding risks and enhance the local environment, creating a more resilient and attractive stretch of this iconic highway for many years to come – all thanks to the skill of Operating Engineers. The project began in late 2025 and is expected to be completed by fall this year, with help from members with **Vanguard Construction** and **St. Francis Electric**.

Members with **Ghilotti Construction** have started three new projects. The first is a \$38 million pedestrian and bike bridge over Hwy. 101 between Santa Rosa Junior College and Cleveland Avenue. The second is a \$4.8 million project for the City of Santa Rosa, replacing 4,000 feet of water mains, 1,000 feet of sewer mains and multiple storm drain catch basins, as well as repaving the neighborhood surrounding Montgomery High School. The third is a \$3.5 million bridge-replacement project in the County of Sonoma, which is covered by a PLA (Project Labor Agreement).

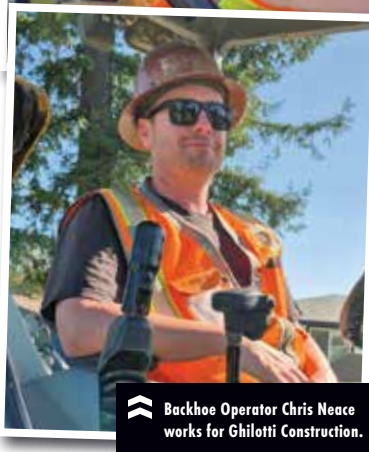
Myers & Sons is working under a PLA for Sonoma Water. The \$6.8 million project consists of upgrading an existing water-treatment plant booster station and installing a new pipe. **Argonaut Constructors** recently started two paving projects for the City of Santa Rosa. The first is a \$10.5 million project on Calistoga Road from Montecito Boulevard to Hwy. 12, and the second is a \$4 million project on Hopper Avenue. **Ghilotti Bros., Inc.** is working on a \$23 million paving project for Caltrans on Hwy. 101 in San Rafael, which involves culvert repair in addition to grinding and paving. **Myers-Disney Joint-Venture (JV)** is working on an \$18.3 million project replacing a bridge, widening a box culvert, performing creek habitat restoration and paving on Hwy. 1 in Point Reyes.

Data storage work; mines updates

From Reno
Members in Northern Nevada are extremely busy this season. The data storage work in the Reno area has hundreds of members working, with no signs of letting up anytime soon. The USA Parkway area continues to expand, with more storage facilities being built between Hwy. 80 and Hwy. 50. Construction in the Reno and Sparks area is busy, as well, with projects scattered all around the valley. Numerous projects are continuing in Carson City and the surrounding areas in the east and south. Members on the Thacker Pass project are pushing hard to complete the project by the end of the year, with crews working around-the-clock. Overall, there is ample opportunity for our brothers and sisters who are on the Out-of-Work List in their home districts to find work here.

From Elko
Acha Construction is in full swing at the Tribal School project in Owyhee, continuing to work on the new fire station in Battle Mountain (scheduled for completion in October) and bidding on more work in the area. **Ames Construction** continues to keep members busy at the Meikle Mine in Carlin, the Granite Creek Project in Golconda and the Orla Mining Road Rehab project, which will upgrade over 20 miles of roadway into the new South Railroad Mine. The company has also picked up a new project at the lithium mine in Winnemucca.

N. A. Degerstrom, Inc. has members working at the Bald Mountain Mine Site, the Rain Mine just outside of Carlin and the Gold Bar Mine in Eureka and is bidding on new projects in the area. **Road & Highway Builders** is continuing work on the downtown beautification project in Ely, as well as the bridge demolition and reconstruction project in Halleck. **Rango Construction** has picked up a few new mining projects in the area. **Sterling Crane** continues work at Nevada Gold Mines (NGM) and has completed the annual mill shutdown project

in Carlin. **93 Construction** has picked up two new projects and continues to grow.

At the time of publication, gold is worth \$4,876.60 per troy ounce. OE3's mine membership ratified a new three-year contract with NGM that included increases to wages, PTO, tool allowances, weekly indemnity and bereavement leave. We would like to thank the Bargaining Committee for all the long hours of hard work they put in to getting a fair contract for the membership. It's going to be a busy season for mining this year, as the price of gold continues to rise.

The Mine Expo in Elko will take place June 4-5, and you are invited to meet us at Booth 624! We will be giving away swag and hosting a gift card drawing. The Northern Nevada Operating Engineers Joint Apprenticeship Committee (OE3 JAC) will also be in attendance with a simulator, for anyone who wants to try their hand at equipment operation. This will be our sixth year as an event sponsor, and it's always a fun time. We hope to see you there!

Brothers of the hook

Report

Following the passage of the Creating Helpful Incentives to Produce Semiconductors (CHIPS) and Science Act in 2022, several major semiconductor manufacturers began investing heavily in U.S. domestic production, including Texas Instruments (TI), the largest foundational semiconductor manufacturer in the country. One of those investments is in an estimated \$4 billion semiconductor plant in the “Silicon Slopes” area of Lehi.

When you drive by the TI site, the cranes immediately stand out – even from miles away. **Bragg Crane** and **Mountain Crane** are working on the project, with **Bragg Crane** taking on all the rebar and concrete form work, and **Mountain Crane** focusing on the structural steel portion of the project. Typically, these two companies are competitors; however, the companies have come together to get this job done safely and efficiently.

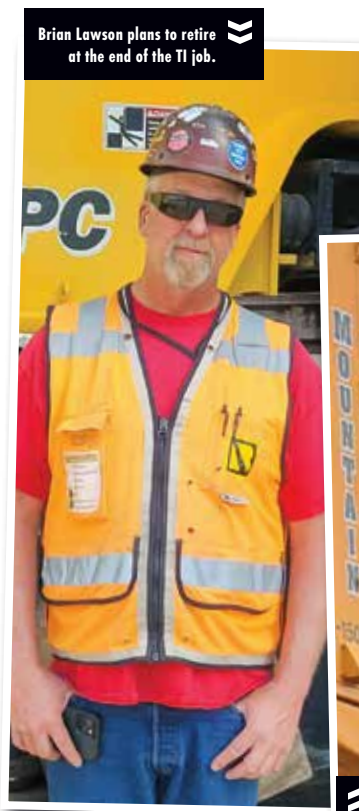
Bragg Crane has been onsite since June 2025, with nine cranes ranging from 150 tons to 185 tons, and is planning to wrap up in July. **Bragg Crane** Supervisor **Brian Lawson** has big plans for the conclusion of this job: Retirement! **Brian** said his 31-year career in the union has been good for him, and as far as what comes next, he said, “Whatever I want!” Congratulations on your retirement, **Brian**!

Foreman **Trent Poulsen** is leading the **Mountain Crane** crew, which is currently operating eight cranes, two of which are massive LR-11350 crawlers. These members are placing steel trusses that weigh over 600,000 pounds. **Trent** shared that in the past decade of travelling around the U.S. as a crane operator, he has only witnessed this size of crane one time, at SpaceX. Having two on the same jobsite is incredibly rare!

A job this big requires communication, attention to safety and a skilled workforce. Even though the companies might be competitors, everyone onsite is committed to working together. As one member said, when it comes down to it, they are all “Brothers of the Hook.”

Ho’opili water transmission upgrades

Report

Aloha, Brothers and Sisters! We’re proud to share that **Goodfellow Bros.** has been awarded major infrastructure work tied to the ongoing development at Ho’opili on the west side of O’ahu. This project represents another strong opportunity for Local 3 members to showcase the skill, safety and professionalism that defines our union.

The project includes the demolition of an existing water transmission line, followed by the installation of a new, 42-inch water transmission main. This critical upgrade will support long-term water capacity and reliability for the growing Ho’opili community. A wide range of work is expected, including excavation-trenching, pipe-laying, alignment, installation, backfilling, compaction, site-restoration and coordination with utility crews and safety teams.

This project has been awarded at \$11.19 million, reinforcing the scale and importance of this infrastructure investment in west O’ahu. It’s another example of how union contractors, like **Goodfellow Bros.**, continue to secure vital infrastructure work that keeps our members employed and our skills in demand.

Projects like this not only build communities – they build careers, strengthen our presence and reinforce the importance of union labor in delivering high-quality results. As always, safety will be a top priority. Working around existing utilities and large-diameter pipes requires precision, communication and strict adherence to safety protocols. Continue to look out for one another and represent Local 3 with pride on this jobsite. When Local 3 shows up, we deliver.

Roadway widening on I-680

Report
Work continues on the southbound I-680 improvements from Walnut Creek to Fremont. Members with **Bay Cities Paving and Grading** are performing most of the work on this long-term project, helping deliver critical upgrades that will benefit commuters across the East Bay.

This \$326 million project consists of a new nine-mile southbound Express Lane, along with major paving and roadway improvements. Every day, OE3 members are removing asphalt, grading, preparing subgrade, placing base rock and installing new asphalt. Crews are also involved in bridge modifications, full pavement rehabilitation and sound-wall repair, all of which help improve safety and quality of life for nearby communities.

Improvements across San Joaquin County

Report
Across San Joaquin County, several major infrastructure projects are either in progress or about to start, creating lots of work for our members. The County is investing \$425 million in capital improvements, including the major rehab of the office building at 6 S. El Dorado St. Another public works project coming soon is the Boggs Tract Sustainable Transportation Improvement project, which will install new bike lanes, sidewalks and pedestrian paths.

Stockton Unified School District (SUSD) is deploying \$255 million in bond funds to modernize campuses and enhance safety. Projects currently out for bid related to this funding include the Primary Years Academy classroom expansion and safety fencing installations at Cesar Chavez High School and King Elementary School.

The passage of Measure K in 2024 made \$598 million available for improvements at San Joaquin Delta College. This includes modernization of the Shima, Holt and Budd Centers, urgent infrastructure repairs to underground heating pipes and the development of a new student center and a north county facility. Delta College also continues to partner with local trades organizations and training centers, like the Operating Engineers Local 3 Journeyman and Apprentice Training Center (OE3 JATC), for hands-on demonstrations that show the next generation what a career in the trades looks like.

The City of Stockton continues to support its local workforce, including Operating Engineers, through its Community Workforce and Training Agreement (CWTA). This agreement ensures that 85 percent of workers on City projects are Skilled and Trained County residents. Ongoing work under this CWTA includes resurfacing a

major part of the street from Grisby Place to Plymouth Road, upgrading ramps to meet ADA standards and adding new bicycle lanes.

The San Joaquin Building Trades Council (SJBTC) recently celebrated its Spring 2026 MC3 graduation, which helps individuals transition into high-skill, high-wage union careers. Programs like the Resilient Jobsite Builder cohort are empowering tradeswomen to lead the way on our local jobsites.

The partnership between OE3, the SJBTC and public institutions in the County ensures that as San Joaquin grows, it grows stronger, fairer and union-built.

Roadway projects ongoing; election updates

Report
Several large projects have kicked off in the past month. **S. T. Rhoades Construction** is working on a \$6 million roundabout and lighting project just north of Crescent City. Members with **Granite Construction** have completed the bridge approaches on southbound Hwy. 101 near Rio Dell, and are re-routing all traffic on the bridge. Caltrans has two projects: **Myers and Sons** is working on the \$50.5 million Eel River Bridge, and **Steve Manning Construction** is working on a \$71 million wall and earthworks project on Hwy. 299, east of Blue Lake. **Mercer Fraser** is finishing up four bridges and a slide repair on Hwy. 36, so every way in and out of the district has major construction! Expect delays, and remember to respect all construction zones and speed limits to protect our members.

Our District's Political Action Committee (PAC) supported **Natalie Arroyo** for District 4 Supervisor and **Mary Burke** for District 5 Supervisor in Humboldt County. (See pages 14-16 for more recommendations.) Our next focus is on the elections in the cities of Eureka and Arcata. Our PAC works hard to pick the best candidates to support, so continue checking here and online for updated endorsements.

Our union staff works to ensure we have an even playing field in the bid process, but they can't do it without a connection to those serving on awarding bodies, such as the County Board of Supervisors and local City Councils. No matter who is elected, we will continue to communicate and work with local political leaders to keep our members employed.

If you missed the June 1 District Meeting, the next one is on Monday, Aug. 24. We hope to see you there! If you are interested in a quick refresher on how to set a grade laser, bench in or check grade, please contact us. We are working to coordinate these skills refreshers with local and in-district members, so we can ensure this work remains in our field.

Work consists of removal and installation of sewer and water main, including all services. The project began mid-March and is expected to wrap up at the end of this month.

Blade Operator **Marco Torres** finished a slope on the \$9.5 million Hwy. 190/Road 224 roundabout Caltrans project in Porterville, for **Cal Valley Construction, Inc.** Work began in November 2025 and should be completed by the time this is printed.

Excavator Operator **Rodney Menefee** recently finished working on the edge of Trimmer Springs and Big Creek Road at Pine Flat Reservoir on a slope stabilization project, and Loader Operator **Andrew Mottahari** supplied material. The project, awarded to **Walsh and Montgomery Construction, Inc.**, was valued at \$1.3 million and was completed at the beginning of April.

Agee Construction Corporation was awarded a \$3.5 million water main backfilling project for the City of Reedley, as part of a street improvement project. Excavator Operator **Richard Coronado Jr.** is onsite, with loader operators **David Manfredi** and **Jaime Murrieta** supplying material. Work began in the beginning of October 2025 and is expected to be completed at the end of this month.

Title
Downtown Railyards: Built by Operating Engineers

Report
The Wilton Rancheria Tribe has made a significant investment in the Sacramento community by funding the new soccer stadium and entertainment venue in the Downtown Railyards neighborhood. After sitting vacant for half a century, the 244-acre railyards site will almost double the size of the downtown area, once occupied by the Transcontinental Railroad in the 1860s. After its completion in 2028, the venue will be the largest outdoor professional sports and entertainment venue in the Sacramento region and part of the largest infill redevelopment project in the nation. The stadium will be home to the Sacramento Republic FC and will host concerts and landmark events. Aside from the entertainment center, the Downtown Railyards site will include new housing, retail locations, a hotel and a Kaiser hospital. So far, the multi-billion-dollar investment into revitalizing this area has provided many hours of work for Local 3 members, under multiple signatories.

Last year, **Evergreen Engineering & Excavating** performed the clearing, grubbing and demo work on the new soccer stadium, making way for members with **Graniterock** to mass-grade. After some delay due to an updated design

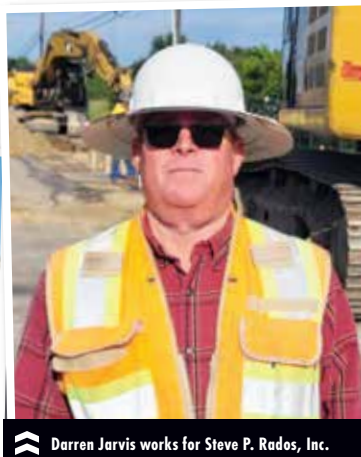
(which will bring the total number of seats to over 20,000), the next phase has been awarded to **Lund Construction**. The \$14 million package includes final grading and paving, as well as underground, joint-trench and concrete work.

Steve P. Rados, Inc. is continuing work on the \$16 million Upper Dry Creek Interceptor Relief project in Antelope. The work consists of the installation of approximately 9,200 linear feet of 36-foot gravity sewer and 19 sanitary sewer manholes, modification to an existing sanitary sewer structure, construction of a new junction structure, the rehabilitation of three Corrugated Metal Pipe (CMP) culverts and pavement restoration.

We hope to see everyone at the June 4 District Meeting at 7 p.m., located in the District Hall.

Signatories on the project include: **Penkor Wrecking**, **MK Pipelines, Inc.**, **Interstate**, **Graniterock**, **West Coast Cranes**, **Peninsula Crane & Rigging**, **O'Grady**, **AAA Fence**, **Rodan Builders**, and **Kier & Wright**. Work on the project is expected to last until next year.

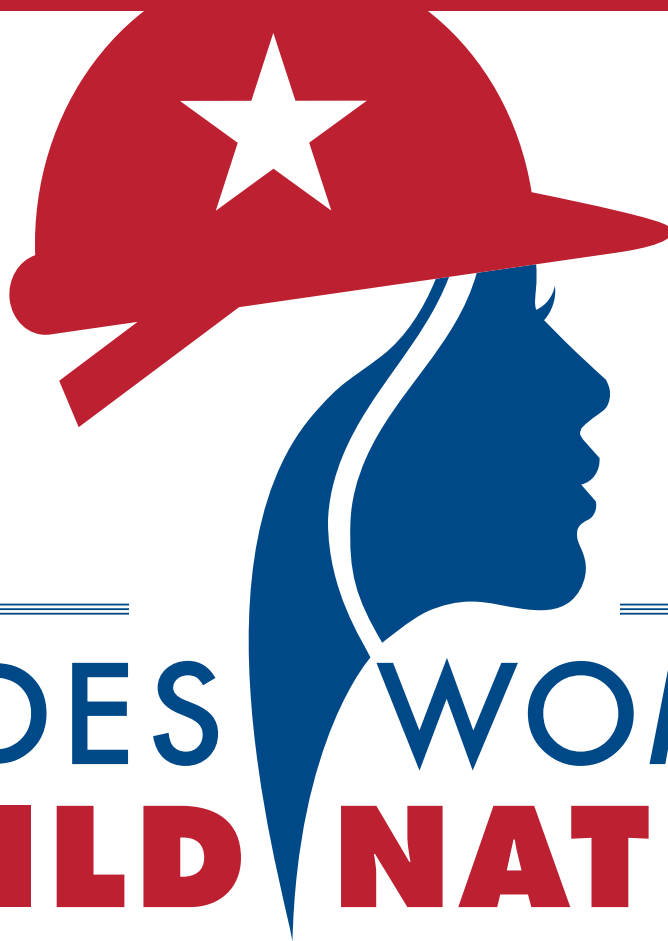

EARLY DETECTION SAVES LIVES

Health screenings are an essential prevention effort and important in maintaining your overall well-being by helping to detect certain diseases—such as cancer—early on. This way, you can catch the disease before severe symptoms begin to develop and start treatment when it’s most effective and less costly. While life can get hectic, taking time to get preventive care is one of the most important investments you can make to protect your long-term health.

Kaiser Permanente recommends the following screenings for individuals at average risk. Please note that personal risk factors, including family history, current medications, and genetic tendencies, may mean you should start receiving certain screenings earlier or more frequently. Always talk to your doctor first about what’s right for you:

- » **Colon cancer:** Start at age 45 with an annual at-home fecal immunochemical test (FIT). A follow-up colonoscopy is recommended if results are positive.
- » **Breast cancer:** Start at age 40 with a mammogram at least every two years.
- » **Cervical cancer:** Start at age 21 with a Pap test, human papillomavirus (HPV) test, or both, every three to five years.
- » **Prostate cancer:** Talk with your doctor about risk factors, especially if you are 45 or older. Screening is typically every two years through ordered blood tests if you choose to proceed.
- » **Lung cancer:** Start at age 50 if you have a 20 pack-year smoking history (smoked one pack of cigarettes per day for 20 years or two packs per day for 10 years) and currently smoke or have quit smoking within the past 15 years. Screening uses a low-dose CT scan.

Be proactive and take the next step by scheduling an appointment with your doctor to discuss your screening needs. You may also use Kaiser’s screening tool at www.kp.org/screening-tool to get quick recommendations before your next doctor’s visit.

Save Big on Surgery

If you’re an active member or a retired (non-Medicare) member in California or Utah and enrolled in the PPO plan, here’s a simple tip that could save you money: Ask your doctor about having your surgery done at an ambulatory surgical center. For many procedures, these centers usually mean lower out-of-pocket costs than a hospital outpatient setting.

The best part? You can focus all your energy on getting better instead of worrying about the bill.

If you’d like help finding an ambulatory surgical center near you, or you want to double-check that your doctor and surgical team are in-network before you schedule, just call the Anthem Medical Assist Line:
